Father Phil's Ramblings

Finding Time For Prayer

Twenty some years ago when I was a student at St. Ignatius College Prep, several priest and lay faculty promoted opportunities for prayer among the students. I can still remember my junior year math teacher giving me a book by Fr. Mark Link, SJ on how to begin praying. The simple basics about prayer that I learned at age 16 are still with me and over the years I've learned the importance of staying true to them.

One of the basics I learned is that developing a regular prayer life includes setting aside a time and place that helps you pray without too many distractions. A mother of three regularly talks with God while driving the van after dropping the kids off at school; a husband quietly shares his day with God walking home from a commuter train after work; a retired person thumbs through a book of prayers every morning while sitting at the kitchen table. In each case a person develops a habit of prayer; a regular time and place dedicated to communion with God.

One special opportunity we have for prayer at St. Juliana Parish is on Monday evenings. Each Monday, a group of parishioners gather in the chapel at 7:00 pm for an hour of prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. Beginning September 8th, the format will change slightly. At the beginning of the hour I'll offer a brief reflection on a gospel passage, followed by twenty minutes or so of silence for your own quiet prayer and reflection. Then those gathered are invited to pray five decades of the rosary.

If you are looking for a regular opportunity for prayer and Monday evenings could work for you, please consider joining us. If you cannot remain for the full hour, try coming for half an hour. I'll have some more suggestion and recommendations about prayer in next week's bulletin.

September Song

“ O, it’s a long, long time from May to December; and the days grow short when you reach September...”

That was one of the songs in the repertoire of the Melody Knights dance - band from St. Ignatius High School when by brother and I played for teen dances in the city. Seems like truly a “long, long time” ago. The song had - and still has for me - a poignancy which so wonderfully expresses the end of summer and the entrance to fall: the leaves change color and eventually fall, the recreations of summer give way to school - uniforms, backpacks full of books and such, the sounds and smells of classrooms which lay dormant for weeks.

There is a dying and a coming alive. The liturgy of human life.

Jesus says in today’s Good News: “Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile. From within people, from their hearts, come evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit, licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, folly. All these evils come from within and they defile.

Ooooph! That list jarred me even just in the typing of it! Pretty heavy stuff, like discovering a malignancy or gangrene within oneself.

Whenever I have the great joy of baptizing little babies, I usually like to remind the parents and godparents that the little ones they hold with such protective, overwhelming love are, first and foremost, God’s children. Baptism reveals who they really are. It also reveals the awesome responsibility we family members have to see that that “revelation” becomes a reality for our children themselves.

As we begin this new school year, we adults must remember that children are great imitators: they will become what they see that we are, as individuals and a society. It is so very important that we exemplify for them the positive side of what Jesus is speaking about:

 Truthfulness (“I broke that!”)
 Self-control -
 (“No I won’t use my cell phone in here!”)
 Sense of God (“Sssh! Not in Church!”)
 Friendliness (“May I help you?”)
 Thinking twice (“I better not do that!”)

How will the positive attitudes and behavior “get inside” our youngsters? They have to practice. Who will “coach” them?

Society is what we make it. But “make it” we must.

“Make it” = “educate” it.

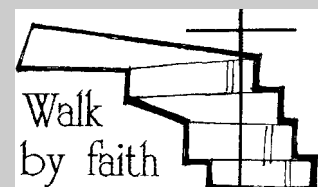

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Labor Day originated in 1882 in New York City under the aegis of the Knights of Labor. Congress made it a legal holiday in 1894. Observing it this week gives us a good opportunity to reflect on the Catholic Church's social teachings for the last century or so. On May 15, 1891, Pope Leo XIII issued the encyclical Rerum Novarum on the condition of the working classes and labor. In doing so, he initiated a century in which Catholic teaching became more and more involved in the social issues of the day.

Unfortunately relegated to the shadows while the bright lights of controversy shine on other issues, Catholic social teaching remains largely unknown to many Catholics. It is the Catholic Church that championed such notions as a fair day's pay for a fair day's work, and continues to uphold the dignity of the human person against attacks from governments and corporations. Nearly every pope since Leo XIII has issued teachings on the subject. Take some time this Labor Day to familiarize yourself with some aspect of the Church's social teachings. In doing so, you will be taking responsibility as a member of the Body of Christ to commit yourself to the care of your neighbor.
