*Father Phil's Ramblings*

In today's readings we are confronted with issues that touch a very deep part of our human experience. The issue of committed relationships, both in marriage and outside marriage. What makes marriage holy? What does it mean to be in a committed relationship?

In the often-used text from the Book of Genesis, the author tells us that God said (and we know that when God speaks, everyone should listen) "It is not good for the man to be alone. "I will make him a suitable partner." My question is, isn't it also not good for women to be alone?

Next, the Lord God puts Adam to sleep, removes one of his ribs, awakens him and shows Adam his wonderful creation: WOMAN. I wonder what Adam said when he saw Eve standing naked before him? I am sure that Adam was very happy. Wouldn't you be happy to be joined in Paradise by a partner?

Sometimes we overlook the one basic truth in the Creation of Woman story. That is the SHOCKING revelation that Adam and Eve - man and woman - are EQUAL! Women are still fighting for that equality today. In the Gospel story, Jesus is asked, "Is it lawful for a husband to divorce his wife?" Again, I ask, what about women divorcing their husbands?

Today, more than 50% of marriages end in divorce. That statistic saddens me because I believe that the sacraments of Marriage and the Eucharist are signs to everyone of the presence of Jesus, the committed one, to the world.

I return to that word, commitment. Where there is a lack or absence of commitment, there is not a sacrament of Marriage. Commitment can be truly understood through this little story:

A chicken and a pig were walking down the street one day. The chicken said to the pig, "Let's have breakfast." The pig responded, "What shall we eat?" Of course we should have ham and eggs!" said the chicken. The pig was shocked and said in reply, "For you that is easy, for you that's involvement. For me, that is TOTAL commitment."

I pray today that each and every one of you will be living such committed relationships. Your commitment and your love are signs to me - and to the world - that Jesus' Message of love is being lived.

Respect Life Sunday

When you hear "respect life", you probably think that the Church would like us to deal with the whole issue of Pro-Life. Of course there are a lot of other issues involved with that one. Bio-genetics, stem-cell research and treatment of certain ailments. Mind boggling to try to keep up with it all, isn't it?

Respect for Life. If we put it in everyday terms, perhaps we'll find there's a lot to be desired. Or, to put it positively, there's plenty of potential for respecting life. It's not limited to the scientists or the theologians or the highly skilled medical professionals. Respect for life is not just a decision not to have an abortion.

Respect for life begins when we see one of our children "punching out" a little companion and we take him by the hand and say "Bobby, we don't do things like that. Now say your sorry to your friend Georgie." Who is the "we" who don't do things like that? Is it just people in general, a nameless blob of humans. Or is the "we" us, our family. "Our family doesn't do things like that, Bobby!"

Saying you're sorry respects the life of another person, whether that person is 2 or 42 years old. "I'm sorry" is to a social convention which simply smoothes things over so that you can continue to get what you want from that person; whether it's equal time on the swing in the yard or acknowledgement at the next cocktail-party. Respecting life is its own reward. We don't "use it" to get something else we might have our eyes on. Kids might do that, but we try to teach them that politeness, respecting other peoples' rights or convenience is the "way life is lived."

When I was a kid, I delighted in stomping on ants. Can you imagine that! Just for the fun of it! I'd search them out and if they got into the cracks in the sidewalk, I'd wait until they come out and played the merciless giant to their diminutiveness. Respect for life? Hey, man! These bugs and 'creatures' are here for my pleasure. Whassa problem?"

What about using a cell-phone in a public place? Respect for life, eh? How about driving down a side street at 40 miles an hour? Or maybe littering the public sidewalk or the street? Gossiping the life out of someone? Making crude jokes about different ethnic groups? Killing someone's reputation? Respect for life indeed!!

The need to respect life is necessary in our lives from the very beginning of our consciousness as we learn to live as humans. In fact, there is no other way to be **HUMAN**.

REACHING OUT

We live in a society that has many technological avenues for communication, stimulation, and entertainment, one in which the urban population exceeds the non-urban. It is curious, then, that loneliness is such a common malady. It is easy to reach out and touch someone, we are told. But—in truth—it is not all that easy, and statistics from the mental health field bear this out.

Today's readings are about the ways in which we can authentically reach out: God touches Adam to create a mate and end his isolation; God-in-Jesus takes on human flesh, even suffering death, in order that we might come to glory; Jesus reaches out to the children whom the disciples had tried to keep away, showing us the manner in which we must approach the loving embrace that awaits us in heaven.

Until that day, however, we must remember that ours is a sacramental Church, a Church of signs of the love of God. And so we are called to reach out continually to ease the loneliness and the barriers that separate us from one another and from the love of Christ.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Using beads for prayer and meditation is an ancient custom, found in many cultures and religions. The Christian rosary dates from the twelfth century, when it provided a way for ordinary Christians to learn about the lives of Jesus and Mary.

Alan de la Roche, a fifteenth-century Dominican, preferred "Psalter of Our Lady" to "rosary." This fitting name recalls an explanation of the devotion's origin. Unable to read the one hundred fifty psalms that formed the Church's "official" daily prayer, medieval Christians substituted first one hundred fifty Pater Nosters, and later one hundred fifty Ave Marias. By meditating on the various mysteries of the rosary while repeating these simple prayers, the faithful could immerse themselves in the whole mystery of the Incarnation and the Resurrection.

This week's celebration of Our Lady of the Rosary on October 7th is an appropriate reminder of this venerable form of prayer. Faithful Christians everywhere continue to meditate on the mysteries of the rosary, praying in groups or alone. Why not take advantage of this week's celebration to renew your acquaintance with the rosary?
