Father Phil's Ramblings

Last week, the priests met in the church to talk over and plan the implementation of the changes that are urged concerning the celebration of the Eucharist. Many of the changes are minor and all of them will be explained during the month of November, at masses and in the bulletin.

One of the most important issues concerning the Eucharist is reverence and respect for the Body and Blood of Christ, and reverence and respect for the presence of Christ in one another.

Allow me to explain.

We are invited to a banquet each week, to share together the meal of the Last Supper. The respect that I see lacking is in the late arrivals and early departures of those invited to the banquet. Sometimes, I stand at the altar and watch in dismay:

- people just taking their seats as the Word of the Lord is being read, or even as the gifts are being offered;
- a mass exodus down the aisles immediately following Holy Communion;
- more guests departing before the final song and recessional.

I know at times there are places to go and people to meet, but five more minutes shouldn't change your plans. **Especially since each and every second of our lives are gifts from the Lord.** To me, the early departures especially show a lack of respect for the Host who invited us to partake of the meal of the Lord. I'll be speaking about further need for respect in future bulletins.

"Habemus Papam!"

In October of 1978 I was back in the U.S. for a second visit home with family and friends. My first return after seven years in India was in 1972 for my priestly ordination with my brother Phil.

I was visiting some Jesuit friends at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. At the time, the Cardinals were meeting in consistory in Rome to elect the new Pope. Names of possible candidates had been bandied about and the media were having a field-day conjecturing just who would succeed Pope John Paul I. There was an air of excitement in the recreation room at Georgetown where we were gathered to monitor the papal proceedings.

Of course there was the usual blend of pessimists and optimists in our gathering; some "poo-pooing" the whole "antiquated" process in favor of something more hi-tech and "up-to-date." Others of us had a sense of the incarnated working of the Holy Spirit that day: a little like the original Pentecost, one might say. God was going to definitely intervene in the life of the Church these days; if not today, then tomorrow; but certainly within days. And because of the modern communications media, we were all privy to this "new Pentecost" in the life of us all in 1978.

There were two separate rooms in the Jesuit rec room at Georgetown. Some stayed glued to the T.V.; others of us spoke in lowered tones (why "lowered" I do not know) in the ante-room.

Then, those watching T.V. heard the fateful announcement traditionally made in Latin: "Habemus Papam! We have a Pope!" Earlier, white smoke had been seen from the special chimney erected for that purpose, indicating that someone had, indeed, been elected Pope. As his name rolled over the crowds in St. Peter's Square, the media were thrown into a frenzy; they had no information about this man! His name was announced: "Karol Wojtyla" ("Voiteewa" - the "l" in the sir-name has a diacritical mark through it, rendering it a "w" sound in Polish)! One man watching T.V. ran into the room where we were and shouted: "We have an African Pope!!" The name sounded so strange to him that he conjectured it was African not Polish.

To their great embarrassment, the media had to scrounge for information about Karol Wojtyla. "Karol Wojtyla? Who he?" Commentators kept up a patter while lackeys searched media-files to get some idea of who the new Pope was. It was comic in its own way. Satisfying in another. There were no "front-runners," "no shoe-ins," no "right men for the job." Isn't that just like the Holy Spirit? Isn't that just like Jesus in the choosing of His followers?

Oh yes, I am proud that Pope John Paul II is of Polish descent. But I'm even more proud of the man himself. Of course there will be some who will say: "He shoulda done this or he shoulda done that; if only he had been more like this rather than that; he coulda done so much more for this cause or that cause." O well... The Spirit works with and through humans in a time-bound economy of salvation. Ask any pastor of, say, 3100 families or so, how difficult it is to satisfy everyone.

I get the distinct impression that Pope John Paul II loves us and that means a lot to me.

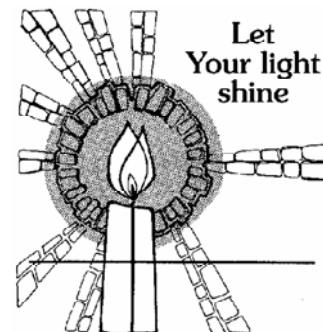

GOING TO EXTREMES

"Extreme" would describe many of the passages in today's readings. In Proverbs, Wisdom is preferable to scepter, throne, riches and gems; before her, gold is like sand and silver is mud. In Hebrews the word of God is like a sword penetrating and slicing soul and spirit, joints and marrow. In Mark's Gospel Jesus tells the rich young man to give up everything, that it is hard for the rich to enter the kingdom of God, that whatever we give up we will receive a hundredfold--including persecution. Scripture uses tough words when it has a tough message to convey.

"Overwhelmed." That is how Mark describes the people who received Jesus' preaching. Were we truly to take all of these images to heart we, too, would be overwhelmed. Perhaps this is a good test of how deeply we allow the Gospel message to penetrate our lives. If these passages aren't overwhelming us, making us break out into a cold sweat, causing us to tremble a bit at the prospects they hold, then maybe we haven't really heard them.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Forty-one years ago today Pope John XXIII opened the Second Vatican Council with these challenging words: "Our duty is not just to guard this treasure, as though it were some museum piece and we the curators, but what is needed at the present time is a new enthusiasm, a new joy and serenity of mind." As the participants in Vatican II proceeded with their deliberations, the first document they produced was the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, for they knew that it is from the liturgical life of the Church that everything else we do proceeds.

This seminal document, arrived at after much debate and approved virtually unanimously, set the tone for the entire Council to follow. It also set in motion the liturgical reforms that we are still implementing today. Perhaps no single phrase of the entire Vatican Council has had more influence on the life of the Church over the last half-century as the Constitution on the Liturgy's ringing declaration that "full and active participation by all the people is the aim to be considered before all else."

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

In the weeks to come, your parish bulletin will carry explanations of the Holy Eucharist and the Sacrament of Reconciliation, along with some instructions on how we are to celebrate these sacraments as God's Holy People in the Archdiocese of Chicago. I always enjoy worshipping God with you when I celebrate Mass in the parishes and institutions of the Archdiocese, and I hope now for a moment of renewal in our worship.

As you know, the sacraments are acts of faith. We believe that the risen Christ acts through the sacraments. He gives us grace, which brings us into his own life here and in the life to come. The sacraments are acts of the Church. The Church knows what Christ gives her the power to do, and it is the Church that puts order into the celebration of the sacraments. The Church, in the words of Vatican II, is a "hierarchical communion" gathered around Christ, our mediator with the Father. That reality shapes our worship. The royal priesthood of the baptized is made active in the Mass by the ministry of ordained priests, so that the Eucharist is the action of the whole Christ, made visible in head and members in his body, the Church.

The sacraments are rites. When the national anthem is played, everyone rises. That is a secular rite. The sacraments are rites of the faith community; they require common responses and actions. It is easier to respond since the liturgy was put into the vernacular, and most people do so with good voice. Likewise most people act together, for example, making the Sign of the Cross at the beginning of the Mass. We worship as a body, with various members taking different roles and functions, in an integrated pattern. Normally, we sit to listen, we stand out of respect, and we kneel to adore.

The Catholics of the Archdiocese of Chicago worship using the Roman rite, and the *Roman Missal* has recently been

slightly revised. This revision necessitates a few changes in the way we worship together. These changes will be explained in the fall and will come into effect on the First Sunday of Advent, November 30, 2003. This revision does not affect celebrations of the Eucharist that use the Roman rite as it was done before the revisions called for by the Second Vatican Council. It also does not affect the worship of Catholics in Cook and Lake counties who belong to the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church or to the Syro-Malabar Catholic Church or to the Maronite or other Eastern Catholic Churches, for these communities worship according to their own rites.

The explanations and instructions to follow are like a collective examination of conscience about the state of our worship. Our participation in worship should be deliberate or conscious, active, and fruitful. Sometimes we participate by acting and speaking, sometimes by silence and recollection. Participation is always conditioned by an interior disposition of faith, hope, and charity.

The charity that brings us to the Eucharist also brings us from the Eucharist into a world in need of love. Because we are one with Christ, it is his love that we are to bring to others. In the Archdiocese, we are talking more and more about sharing Christ's spiritual gifts, that is, evangelizing. The Eucharist both gives us the zeal to introduce others to Christ and is itself the greatest gift we are to share, for it is Christ himself. The Mass is the means by which God makes holy the world; it is the worship that the human race offers to the Father, adoring him through Christ in the Holy Spirit. It is the most important thing we do, the only thing we will do for all eternity. Thank you for all your efforts to do it well.
