Father Phil's Ramblings

This weekend we celebrate 25 years of Pope John Paul II's leadership in the Church. Pope John Paul II is the 263rd successor of St. Peter as Bishop of Rome. The election of Pope John Paul II broke a precedent in that he was the first non-Italian pope since Pope Hadrian VI in 1552. Hadrian VI was from the Netherlands.

Pope John Paul II is truly a man of God, a faithful warrior, and a steadfast ambassador of the faith as well. He has traveled to countless countries and covered over 700,000 miles -- the equivalent of going around the world 29 times! Sadly, the years and miles have taken their toll and the man we fondly recall as vivacious and full of vigor, is today bent and suffering from many illnesses.

Pope John Paul II will be most remembered for three attributes: As a tireless preacher of peace; as a dedicated teacher of Catholic-Christian faith; and his great defense of the poor. He also has a gift for wonderfully memorable and touching gestures, such as kissing the soil upon his first visit to a country, embracing children and the handicapped, and the one that I most love, inserting a prayer scroll into a crevice of Jerusalem's western wall. One of his favorite phrases is, "I am a bishop for you, I am a Christian with you."

To mark this occasion we will honor and pray for the Pope at a Waltz-Polka Music Mass on Saturday at 5:00 PM. Our prayer for Pope John Paul II is *Stolat!* A hundred years, God willing.

✠ Also this weekend, we celebrate Mission Sunday. Our prayers and monetary gifts for the missions and the men and women who serve in far-off countries, help us to appreciate what we have. They also serve to remind us of the universal call to spread Jesus' message of love to everyone.

✠ Our women's CRHP (Christ Renews His Parish) team is currently leading a program for other women of the parish. For those who participate, the CRHP weekend is an opportunity to more fully recognize God's spirit in each other. This is achieved through prayer, the sacraments and the witnessing of faith. We pray for both the facilitating team and participants.

✠ Parishioners have questioned the need to publish our weekly offering in the bulletin. The reason we do so is actually quite reasonable: I want everyone to be aware of our financial status and needs. A month ago, I spoke at all the masses and stated that to have a balanced budget we need \$18,500 per week. The weekly report makes us all aware of the shortfall. It is not unusual to do this. In fact, nearly every other parish publishes their weekly collections in their bulletin. I believe that reaching our collections goal is critical to St. Juliana remaining a vital parish, and it is equally important to share that information.

Speaking of income, specifically our Steak Fry and Birthday Party Grand Raffle fund-raisers, I wanted to wait until all the outstanding payments had been finalized before publishing the proceeds from these events. The total net income from Steak Fry was \$22,769, and the total net income for the Grand Raffle (less picnic expenses) was \$13,773. The amount that we had hoped to raise through these events was \$28,000 for Steak Fry and \$25,000 for the Grand Raffle.

"Teacher, We Want You To Do For Us Whatever We Ask Of You!"

Jesus looks at these two sons of Zebedee and asks: "What do you want me to do for you boys?" Well, you know their response, no? They say: "In your glory let us sit one on your right, and one on your left." Jesus replies: "Fellas, you don't know what you're asking. Can you drink the cup that I drink or be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" Cocky youngsters that they are, they answer: "You bet!!"

For those of us who know about people on the "right" and "left" of Jesus, James and John do seem not just presumptuous but somewhat "clueless." The honor of being on the right and left of Jesus belonged to the two thieves who were crucified with Him.

"Oh, yes!" You shall drink the cup I drink and be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized," says Jesus. But for some time, the disciples did not realize that the request was quite the opposite: "Friends, I want you to do for me whatever I ask of you!"

Suppose Jesus were to come to you and say: "If you will offer your life's sufferings pains and frustrations to me to add to my "cup", to complete the sufferings I began with my life and death, I will save Adolf Hitler from eternal damnation. In fact, I will make salvation available to all humans, if you will drink from my cup and be baptized in suffering as was I - as I still am in all my suffering members."

Visiting our sick brothers and sisters in the hospital or in their homes, just listening to very good people speaking of their grief's and physical and mental anguish, seeing good people in our families, yours and mine, I cannot but help asking what must often come to your own lips: "Why, Lord? Why this good person, this innocent child, this old person who has served You so well and faithfully; why do they now have to suffer so much while the 'evil' ones of our world seem to revel in health and wealth?!"

Over the years, it has occurred to me that God continues to offer the cross to those capable of carrying it for the benefit of all the people in the world, past and present. Certainly we cannot think that people suffering from illness and grief and aging and ailments of the spirit as well as the body are being "punished" for their infidelities! I cannot believe that my Mom and Dad's final illnesses were the "price" they were paying for lives misspent. But then?

After years of praying and reflecting on this "suffering of good people," it seems so like God's plan initiated in Jesus Christ, and lived out in human time and history. Our sufferings are part and parcel of being a human being. Even God in Jesus had to become part of that human economy in order to bring new meaning and divine power into it. Whereas before, human suffering and human evil itself, seemed to hold sway over the world, now, because of Jesus Christ, God-Incarnate, human pain and frustration and weakness have become the instruments of salvation for the whole world.

Suppose our suffering, even our deaths, have the same power to save that the sufferings of Jesus had? Paul says that we have been baptized "into union with Christ Jesus; we were baptized into union with His death. By our baptism, then, we were buried with Him and shared His death, in order that just as Christ was raised from death, so also we might live a new life." (Rom. 6/1-4)

The questions is: Do I want to save all people? Do I want my sufferings to help the whole world?

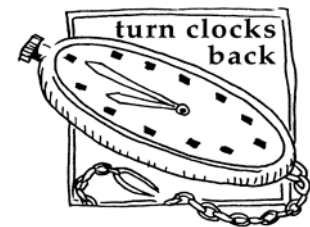

FATHER MIKE'S NOTES

Today in Rome Pope John Paul II will beatify Mother Teresa of Calcutta a brief 6 years after her death in September 1977. I remember getting up very early on the day of Mother Teresa's funeral to watch the televised mass broadcast live from India. During the funeral Cardinal Angelo Sodano, the Vatican Secretary of State, preached the homily. I thought his words were very fitting, so I am enclosing part of the homily below. Speaking of Mother Teresa's life, the cardinal said:

The story of Mother Teresa's life is no mere humanitarian exploit, as she would be the first to declare. It is a story of biblical faith. It can only be explained as a proclamation of Jesus Christ by — in her own words — "loving and serving him in the distressing disguise of the poorest of the poor, both materially and spiritually, recognizing in them and restoring to the image and likeness of God." It has been said that Mother Teresa might have done more to fight the causes of poverty in the world. Mother Teresa was aware of this criticism. She would shrug as if saying: "While you go on discussing causes and explanations, I will kneel beside the poorest of the poor and attend to their needs." The beggar, the leper, the victim of AIDS do not need discussions and theories; they need love. The hungry cannot wait for the rest of the world to come up with the perfect answer; they need effective solidarity. The dying, the handicapped and the defenseless unborn, who are without a constituency in the utopian ideologies which, especially in the last 200 years, has been trying to model the perfect world, need a loving human presence and a caring hand.

Mother Teresa of Calcutta offered the poor of the world her love and her caring hand. The task before us is to continue what she began by doing whatever good we can do now for those in need. We may live in Edison Park, Niles or Park Ridge, but if we open our eyes we will recognize there are people in need of our caring hearts and hands nearby.

Mother Teresa often said: "The fruit of prayer is faith, the fruit of faith is love, the fruit of love is service and the fruit of service is peace." May all who have admired Mother Teresa strive to learn the compelling lesson which she gave the whole world. May we become people of prayer, faith, service and peace.

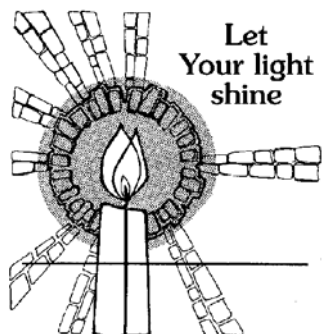
