Father Phil's Ramblings

In August, I published a bulletin article concerning the aging rectory buildings. With both buildings in need of major repairs, we needed to determine whether it was feasible -- in the long-term -- to make those repairs, versus exploring the possibility of constructing a new rectory. Either way, significant financial transactions are at hand. I am enclosing the entire article from that bulletin on the following page and I urge you to read or re-read it in its entirety, and then return to this article.

As planned, we published a Request for Proposal and in return, received a few offers for the purchase of the existing buildings and land. The proposal that looked the best was submitted by Mr. David Cahill of Cahill Builders. He offered \$810,000 for the old buildings and their lots, and also offered to build a new rectory on the north lot at the corner of Touhy and Osceola, at a cost of approximately \$420,000. That leaves an estimated net gain to the parish of \$390,000. The bulk of this amount will be placed in the school's endowment fund. The new rectory plans include a single living suite on the first floor for one priest, and living quarters upstairs to accommodate four priests.

This information was shared with both the parish finance committee and the archdiocese. Pending communication of this proposal to the parish community, the finance committee gave their approval. Staff members of the Real Estate and Facilities and Construction departments at the archdiocese have also approved the proposal and are providing legal assistance as we begin to move forward.

I truly believe that Mr. Cahill's proposal and the completion of the project will be a beneficial addition to our parish facilities and assets. I hope that you -- the parishioners -- agree. I consulted with and listened to many of you and the vast majority have agreed with the plans. I expect there will be questions and I am happy to address them; please feel free to contact me to share your support or concerns.

Father Phil's Ramblings

If you have not yet heard - and the thought of this being a surprise to you would actually be a surprise to me - the parish finance committee and I have been discussing what to do about our aging rectory buildings south of Touhy Avenue. We have considered either renovating the existing buildings, or selling them and constructing a new rectory on the corner of Touhy and Osceola.

Without intuitively realizing it, we began this project last year when we moved the parish business offices across the street to the Parish Center. The move provided for greater business efficiency and allowed the rectory to become more like a home. Even though it was needed, many people had misgivings at first, but now all reports are that the move was a wise one. In fact, had we not made the move, we would not have had room for our new associate pastor, Father Mike McGovern. In preparing for Father Mike's arrival, some improvements had to be made to his living space and it was these improvements that invited me to take a serious look at the condition and future of our aging rectory buildings.

First and foremost, rest assured I would never seek additional funds from the parish at large. We are blessed with generous parishioners, but between the heavy weights of supporting Project 2000 and the ever-increasing costs of operating such a large parish, any thought of fundraising passed out of my mind as quickly as it entered.

But the dilemma of our rectory buildings will not go away, so I sought some information concerning selling the properties at 7140-7146 N. Osceola, and using the proceeds to fund a new rectory. To my great surprise, I learned that the

property is very valuable. In fact, the sale of the property would easily cover the cost of a new structure on the corner of Touhy and Osceola.

Here's what has happened so far: I hired a property inspector to evaluate the current structures, and consulted a local Realtor to help determine the market value. Bishop Frank Kane and a real estate specialist from the archdiocese came out to look over the present structures and their condition. I met with the parish finance committee, and archdiocesan officials and their advisors. In summary, the archdiocese has given us the go-ahead to seek proposals for the sale of the present lots and buildings, and bids for the construction of a new building.

Copies of a Request for Proposal (RFP) have been sent to our finance committee and a Realtor. Interested contractors and developers can obtain a copy of the RFP from our Business Manager, Jeanne Anderson. All proposals are to be received by September 26th, and we are asking the proposals meet one of the following goals:

- the sale of all the property at 7140-48 N. Osceola;
- the sale of the property at 7140-46 N. Osceola;
- a partnership to effect the sale of the property at 7140-46 N. Osceola, along with the construction of a new rectory building at 7148 N Osceola.

I know that this report is lengthy, but I want the parish to know what could happen and hopefully erase any false information you may have heard. The sale of the property, if it is accomplished, will NOT—and I repeat NOT - generate a financial burden or debt for the parish. In fact, there would be additional revenues from the sale of the property that could replenish both the school endowment fund and even establish a parish fund for the future needs of our parish.

Sunday Eucharist

The day-to-day life of a parish varies greatly from one community to another, but the one thing that all Catholic parishes hold in common is the celebration of the Eucharist on Sunday, the Lord's Day. This is the gathering point for all parishioners, the time when everyone comes together. The table of God's Word and the table of the Eucharist feed and nourish the community, refreshing the people and sending them into yet another week of work and struggles, joys and successes, and many opportunities to spread the Kingdom of God. In speech and song, symbol and gesture, we unite our praise and thanksgiving to Christ's perfect self-offering on the cross.

Sunday: The Day of the Lord

From earliest times, Christians have kept Sunday, the Lord's Day, by celebrating the Eucharist, which the Lord gave us as an everlasting memorial of his saving death and resurrection. The Eucharist makes present sacramentally the living mystery of the Lord's Passover from death to life, and our participation in the Mass gives us a unique share in the Passover of Christ. It is no wonder that the Church teaches us that the Eucharist is the source and summit of the Church's life, and that Holy Father invites us to renew our amazement in the face of this great gift.

So important is the liturgy for our lives as Christians that the Church has always taken great care with how the liturgy is celebrated. The essential parts of the liturgy have remained unchanged over the centuries, although the ritual words and form of the liturgy have varied from time to time. The Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) instituted a number of revisions to the *Roman Missal*, calling for changes to help Catholics celebrate the liturgy more deeply. After the Council, there was a major effort to catechize the faithful on the meaning of the liturgy and these revisions. Since then, a whole new generation of Catholics has grown up with the liturgy that we celebrate Sunday after Sunday, week after week, season after season.

The Revised General Instruction

Recently, the Holy See issued a revision of the *Roman Missal* and its introduction, the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal*. This revision has grown out of the years of pastoral experience with the *Roman Missal* that was published immediately after the Second Vatican Council. Respecting the diversity of cultures in the universal Church, the Holy See invited the national conferences of bishops to propose revisions appropriate to their own particular regions.

The changes called for in this revision, relatively minor though they are, give witness to the fact that the liturgy is the prayer of the living Church and so understandably must undergo some changes from time to time. The publication of the revision provides the occasion for renewed catechesis on the understanding and practice of the liturgy, especially the Mass. The hope is that, with this catechesis and reflection, Catholics everywhere can more deeply pray the liturgy with all their hearts and can find the liturgy the wellspring of their spirituality.

Over the next several weeks, we will review several aspects of liturgy (**Ministries and Roles in the Liturgy, Postures and Gestures at Mass, Hearing the Word of God, The Eucharistic Prayer, The Reception of Holy Communion at Mass, Music in the Liturgy, Baptism, Penance & Eucharist**) through articles in our parish bulletin.

“Master, I Want To See !”

Jesus could have furthered the dialogue with Bartimaeus by asking: “And what exactly do you want to see?” Presumably, Bartimaeus knew just why he wanted to see and what he wanted to see. But, then again, he may have been born blind and simply wanted to see because he had heard people extolling the wonder of it all.

How does one explain “seeing” to one who has never “seen” with their eyes? How does one explain loving to one who has never been loved by someone or loved someone? Can one become a “seer” without eyes? Is that, perhaps, what Bartimaeus was asking for: “Master, I want to become a seer of the world, of people, of events!” But the response of Jesus would still be valid: “To what purpose do you want to see, my friend.”

To be a **SEER**. “I want to see, Guru-ji.” My brother Phil knows what that means in a very real way with the eye problems he’s been having of late. (By the way, by brother & I do sincerely thank you for your prayers and enquiries about his health.) And any of you who are experiencing macular degeneration or cataracts know how heartfelt that plea can be: “I want to see!”

To what purpose do we want to be “seers”? There are the obvious beauties of the faces of our loved ones, the wonderful changing leaves and deep, blue skies of this season, the ability to drive without danger to ourselves and others, and so many other more deeply personal reasons - just the desire to remain independent as long as possible.

But there are even more subtle reasons for wanting to “see”, to be a “seer.” One reason might be just to be **AWARE** of people - developing the “peripheral” vision which can catch a person’s eye at the Sign of Peace during the Eucharist or see a fellow parishioner seated at one of the tables at the door of the church. Becoming a “seer” might entail becoming aware of the little children coming out of church with their moms and dads, or who might be a little “lost” in the crowd. It could mean seeing the bus-boy in the restaurant who places the water on the table or who picks up the dirty dishes. It might possibly mean sensing that someone walking in the neighborhood is a stranger to the area, and actually seeing that person.

Where is all this coming from? Well, this morning an elderly parishioner locked her keys in her car - Oh My! I’ve done that; have you? Well, several of us “saw” that and we mobilized ourselves to help her: one made phone calls; another fashioned a coat-hanger “instrument” to see if that would work. The situation was aggravated because our friend’s car was still running and her spare keys were in the car. Steve Ek graciously said his truck was on the way. But in the meantime, a young man in a pick-up stopped for the light on Osceola and Touhy. He was a SEER. To lighten the situation I asked him if he wanted to “join the party.” Well, lo and behold, he said he had one of those simple instruments for opening car doors. He backed up his truck, hopped out, and proceeded to work on the car door. Voila!! It opened!!

So many “seers” gathered in one spot at the same time. Why did that man in the red truck come to that light just at that time? Isn’t life wonderful when we can **SEE**? There is a seeing of the heart which all of us capable of. That is, if we want to.

God bless you, Lou Schoenfeldt, Steve Ek, and Man-in-the-Little-Red-Pick-up! You are **SEERS**, Dudes!



ANNUAL DRUG AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

October 20th marked the beginning of **Red Ribbon Week** activities at St. Juliana School. Throughout the week students will be participating in classroom activities which stress making good choices for their physical, emotional, and spiritual health. Age appropriate science lessons showing the consequences of drug and alcohol addiction will be taught. Students will be asked to share what they have learned about healthy lifestyles by expressing themselves through art, music and original skits.

Weather permitting the Drug Enforcement Agency helicopter will be landing at 10:00 am on Tuesday, October 28th in the school parking lot. So please do not be alarmed when you see the helicopter landing on what might appear to be the school roof!

Also, on Tuesday, October 28th, the **Red Ribbon Week** activities will culminate with a special assembly for all the St. Juliana School students in the Parish Activity Center. At this assembly representatives of the **Drug Enforcement Agency** and the **Chicago Police Department** will be present to speak with the students. Members of the **Chicago Bears** professional football team will visit also to urge the students to make good choices for their health.

The annual nation wide campaign called **Red Ribbon Week** was organized in 1986 by a grassroots organization of parents dedicated to protecting communities from the destruction caused by alcohol and drug abuse and promoting healthy lifestyle choices. The red ribbon was adopted as a symbol of the movement in honor of Enrique Camarena, an agent with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration kidnapped and killed while investigating drug traffickers. The **Red Ribbon Campaign** has reached millions of U.S. children and has been recognized by U.S. Congress.


