At a recent daily mass, the reading was from St. Paul's letter to the Romans, where he said that the Church was the Body of Christ and each and every person of faith were part of the Body. The parish community of St. Juliana is very large and needs the gifts and talents of everyone, beginning with the parish staff.

I ask you to pray for our parish and its wonderful staff.

What is St. John Lateran?

This weekend at all our liturgies we commemorate the Dedication of St. John Lateran in Rome. This feast, observed on November 9th throughout the Church, draws our attention not only to the dedication of the mother church of the City of Rome, but also helps us reflect on the sacred spaces in our own lives.

A little bit of history may be helpful in understanding today's celebration. At the beginning of the fourth century Rome's first Christian Emperor, Constantine the Great, gave his Lateran Palace (named for the Laterani family) to Pope Melchiades for his official residence. The emperor then built the first major Christian basilica on the adjacent property. The basilica church was dedicated to Christ the Saviour in the year 324. Later popes added St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist to the dedication hence the basilica is called St. John Lateran.

Since the late fourteenth century the Popes have resided in the Vatican, and St. Peter's Basilica now hosts most important Papal ceremonies. St. John Lateran is still, however, the cathedral of the diocese of Rome, the original and continuing church for the Pope as Bishop of Rome. The term cathedral refers to a bishop's church, more precisely a church containing a bishop's chair or "cathedra", from which the bishop presides over the community of the faithful.

St. John Lateran is also sacred to the people of Rome because over the centuries thousands and thousands of Romans have been baptized in the Lateran's baptistry. As we celebrate the dedication of this beautiful church in Rome, we also reflect on the sacred places where God has touched us and revealed his presence and love to us in our own lives.

What are the sacred spaces in our lives? Some are obvious, such as a parish church, a family home, or a cemetery where loved ones are buried. Yet there are other spaces that become significant or even "sacred" because important life events happened there: the movie theatre where you had your first date, the restaurant where your husband proposed marriage, your favorite vacation spot, or a busy intersection where you survived a car accident. What makes them holy or sacred? Probably because we felt God came close to us in a unique or memorable way and we never forget that feeling. Let's thank God today for the sacred spaces of our lives and for the love of God that is revealed to us in them.

“Do You Not Know That You Are The Temple Of God, And That The Spirit Of God Dwells In You?”

St. Paul writes to the Corinthians: “You are God’s building. According to the grace of God given to me, like a wise master-builder I laid a foundation, and another is building upon it. But each one must be careful how he builds upon it, for no one can lay a foundation other than the one that is there, namely, Jesus Christ.”

In the aftermath of that terrible fire in downtown Chicago, investigations are revealing that the emergency directives were unclear, outdated, or downright contradictory. Part of the problem was that subsequent generations of owners and users of that building were not aware of the many interconnected rooms and stairwells and what procedure was to be followed in case of fire or other emergency. Even “safety” features built into the structure either did not function or functioned in a faulty manner.

Did anyone have an up-to-date blueprint of the building?

“Brothers and sisters: You are God’s building!” The imagery of the Church as a “building” put together of many parts may be as old as the imagery of it as a “body.” Paul reminds us that he helped lay a foundation upon which others build. Do we all have the same blueprints, or do we continually begin the project “from scratch” according to the style we, or a particular period of history, may desire? There are people who suggest that the original blueprint, i.e. the blueprint of Jesus Himself, was lost shortly after Jesus “disappeared.” These people imply that we must not only “renew” the Church but try to figure out what Jesus

really had in mind for the Church and subsequent generations of Catholic-Christians.

There’s a program on T.V. snippets of which I have glanced at from time to time. It has something to do with house-remodeling competition. Sets of people “race” to refurbish old houses; they are, or so it seems, amateur carpenters, plumbers, plasterers, etc. Sometimes, it may seem that we play: “This Ole Church.” Each decade tries to add its specific design or decorative fillip to this monolith.

This is not to say that the Spirit of God stopped “inspiring” the Church at the death of the last Apostle. But a foundation was laid by those first “Jesus-people,” men and women who did not just “hear” Jesus but **Imbibed** Him and His Life in the Spirit. The blueprint for the Church ever remains the Person of Jesus Christ and His relationship with His Father in the Spirit.

But we must continue to believe that the power of the Spirit is not like some sort of cell-phone whose sound and power fluctuate, depending on distance in time or intricacy of historical events: **CAN YOU HEAR ME NOW?** We have guarantee of Jesus Himself that he work He has begun will certainly, irrevocably, reach its completion. The Spirit will always be vibrant and clear—**YES, WE CAN HEAR YOU NOW!** - in guiding the Church. If not, then we are much to be pitied in the eyes of the world, for we, like the man in the Gospel, have begun to build the House of the Lord but do not have the resources.

Jesus says: “Lo! I am with you **ALWAYS**, to the close of the age.”

Postures and Gestures at Mass

In the celebration of the Mass we raise our hearts, minds, and voices to God. As creatures composed of body as well as spirit, we also pray with our bodies. During Mass we assume different postures: standing, kneeling, and sitting. We also make a variety of gestures: bowing, signing ourselves, shaking hands as a sign of peace, processing to the altar. These postures and gestures are not merely ceremonial. They carry a profound meaning when done consciously, with understanding and faith. Through these postures and gestures, we participate in the liturgy more attentively.

Postures - Standing is a sign of respect and honor. From the earliest days of the Church, standing has been understood as the stance of those who are risen with Christ and seek the things that are above (see Colossians 5). When we stand for prayer, we are assuming our stature before God as a people redeemed by the blood of Christ. We stand when the celebrant and the other ministers process into the church. We stand for the Gospel because we acknowledge that it is Christ himself speaking to us when it is proclaimed. The bishops of the United States have chosen standing as the normal posture for the reception of Holy Communion in this country. **Kneeling** signified penitence in the early Church: The awareness of our sin casts us to the ground! In the Middle Ages, kneeling came to signify the homage of a vassal before his liege lord. More recently, kneeling has come to signify humble adoration. It is for this reason that the bishops of the United States have chosen the posture of kneeling for the assembly during the Eucharistic Prayer, from after singing the Holy, Holy, until after singing the Great Amen. **Sitting** is the posture of attentive listening and of meditation. So the assembly sits for the readings before the Gospel and the homily, and may also sit for the period of meditation after Holy Communion.

Gestures - The Sign of the Cross is the most familiar gesture. We make it over our bodies as we begin Mass and in the blessing at the end of Mass. This gesture, which recalls the saving death of Christ on the cross, first marked our bodies at baptism, when we were claimed for Christ. So, too, during the sprinkling rite at the beginning of Mass or when we take holy water upon entering the church, we make the Sign of the Cross. **Genuflecting** is the gesture of adoration that we make to the presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. Upon entering the church, before taking our place, we genuflect toward the Blessed Sacrament reserved inside the tabernacle. The priest and ministers genuflect before entering the sanctuary if

the tabernacle is located within it. A genuflection is made by bending the right knee to touch the ground. During the Eucharistic Prayer, the priest genuflects three times in adoration of the Blessed Sacrament: after showing the host and then the chalice to the people, and again before he speaks the Invitation to Communion and receives the sacrament himself. **Bowing** is a gesture of reverence. We recognize the altar as a symbol of Christ, and so we stop and bow to it whenever we pass in front of it. The priest and all the ministers bow to the altar after processing to the sanctuary at the start of Mass. In the Creed, we bow at the words that commemorate the Incarnation: "by the power of the Holy Spirit he was born of the Virgin Mary and became man." This gesture signifies our profound respect and gratitude to Christ who humbled himself to share our human condition in order to save us.

There are other gestures that intensify our prayer at Mass. For example, during the Penitential Rite, when we pray the Confiteor ("I confess"), the action of striking the breast at the words "through my fault" can strengthen awareness that our sin is indeed our fault. In the Rite of Peace, we express through our handclasp or embrace that we are committed to

sharing Christ's peace. It is an expression of our desire to live in communion with one another. Thus it is appropriate that before we share in Holy Communion, the sacrament of unity, we make this symbolic gesture with those around us.

A New Gesture - The *General Instruction* asks us to make a sign of reverence before receiving Holy Communion. The bishops of this country have determined that our sign of reverence before receiving the Eucharist will be a bow of the head to the Body and Blood of Christ in the hands of the minister. Through this reverent gesture we honor the living Christ who comes to us as our spiritual food. This bow is not a deep bow from the waist, but a simple bow of the head, made after stopping before the minister of communion. This simple gesture, made by all, unifies us in our visible respect for the Bread of Life and the Cup of Salvation which we are about to receive.

By common postures and gestures, the Church gives witness to and fosters our solidarity in Christ. If individuals were to decide to change them to suit their own piety, that would detract from our unity as one Body. When we stand, sit, kneel, bow, and sign ourselves in common ritual action, we give witness to who we are as the one Body of Christ.

SNOW SHOVELING

Every year we have a group of seventh and eighth graders from our school that volunteer to shovel snow. They eagerly sign up for this project in the fall and look forward to serving those in our parish who need their walks shoveled.

Some questions asked when parishioners call: *when will there be notification that a student is assigned, will we have boy or girl shoveling snow, and is there is any kind of fee involved.*

Mrs. Lidgus, a teacher at St. Juliana has been extremely generous with her time in gathering students who would like to shovel snow. In October she obtains a list of seventh and eighth graders who would like to provide this service.

When parishioners start calling about snow shoveling, students who live nearest to the parishioner are matched to provide the service. The student is asked to contact the parishioner before the snow falls and together arrangements are made as to when he/she should come to shovel. We cannot guarantee boys or girls to shovel snow. It is most disheartening when a student goes to make arrangements and are told they are not

wanted because they are female and may not be strong enough to shovel. A student is usually assigned to shovel for one person. Please let us know if you have a large area to shovel, then two students will be assigned. Students shovel after school has ended for the day, they cannot come before the school day starts. If neighbors will be shoveling for you, please let the student know so they can be put back on the snow shoveling list.

Concerning our students getting paid: *Parishioners who call usually want to give our students some kind of gratuity. This is strictly up to your discretion and should be discussed when the student contacts you. When you call, I can discuss with you what the students usually receive.*

Please note: *it is impossible to find someone to shovel for you on the day of a snow storm, on weekends or on holy days when students are not in school, if you haven't previously signed up for this service. It is important to be put on the snow shoveling list now before the snow falls.*
