Father Phil's Ramblings

Fear of Living - Fear of Dying

November is the month in which we remember all who have died. Since November 2nd was a Sunday, the liturgy was especially aimed at our faith in the Resurrection and in praying for the dead, who are part of the Communion of Saints.

Recently I read an article written by M. Scott Peck, the author who penned The Road Less Traveled. In the article Mr. Peck reveals the illness that has now affected him, Parkinson's Disease. He contemplates his own death, a topic very few of us wish to talk about - even the most intelligent and profound among us.

When asked if he was afraid of death, Mr. Peck replied, "Less than I used to be, but yes, I am still afraid." He admitted that he was critical of people who refuse to face the fact that they are dying until the absolute end. "Terrified they are, and still in denial, even intelligent people. The power of denial among people dying is unbelievable," he wrote.

Mr. Peck has given many lectures on the subject of death, especially after he developed the disease that has presently disabled him. In those lectures he would sometimes pose the question of whether maturely religious people become scared upon facing an imminent death. Death is going into the unknown! We should not for a moment think it is necessarily a sign of our spiritual immaturity that we may become frightened and uneasy at the thought of dying.

In facing death - in facing the dying - there is an opportunity to cleanse, a settling or closing so to speak. There is an opportunity to tell those we love, we truly love them. An opportunity to reconcile with those we have offended.

As I read M. Scott Peck's article, I could not help but reflect upon Jesus' words in the Garden, the night before His death. He said, "Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass away from me." Jesus was scared, too.

As we remember our loved ones who have died and honestly reflect upon our own deaths, also be honest and admit we are scared to go into the unknown. It is not - should not - be a sign of our spiritual immaturity, but just the opposite: To admit our fear we are spiritually very, very mature people of faith.

**“WHEN YOU SEE THESE THINGS HAPPENING,
KNOW THAT HE IS NEAR, AT THE GATES”**

What things? What are we supposed to be looking for? Last week or so, explosions on the sun came barreling towards the earth. Last week the light of the moon was “eclipsed” in a very dramatic way - at least so it seemed to my brother, another Jesuit friend of ours, and me in southern Michigan where we were taking a few days off. The powers of the heavens are shaken and blackened by forest fires, missile explosions, rampaging floods.

“And then they will see ‘the Son of Man coming in the clouds’ with great power and glory, and then He will send out the angels and gather His elect from the four winds, from the end of the earth to the end of the sky.”

“So get with it, Lord,” we might say. Let’s get to the finale - a roll of kettle - drums, a blare of trumpets, we, standing with heads stretched upwards, awaiting the arrival of the “Matrix Man,” “the Terminator,” “the Ultimate Good Guy of All Good Guys.” “So c’mon awready!”

When we look at today’s world--our world--we find that most of the conditions described by Jesus are fulfilled. Maybe they have been for decades. Jesus says: “When you see these things happening, know that he is near.” Not just near but “at the gates”! Just who are we looking for? We know from the life of Jesus 2000 years ago that God delights in throwing our value-system “up for grabs” when it comes to just how He/She should go about matters of salvation.

We are used to “interpreting” Scripture and Tradition to cleanse embarrassing or too-highly-imaginative stories and anecdotes which might be taken too “literally.” Modern exegesis (the study of sources and early traditions) has certainly opened up the reality of God’s entry into our world in the various cultures of the world. But it is not a process of saying: “This is not true; that is not true; this is mere myth and that is mere myth.” Exegesis at its best is a search for meaning and truth. It requires seeing “behind” the imagery used by a particular culture at a particular time in history.

“Know that He is near.” What does that mean for us who are experiencing the very “signs” that Jesus refers to? Jesus doesn’t say: “When you see these things happening, you better get you ‘spiritual act’ together, because the ‘Grim Reaper’ is on the way!” But Jesus says that when we see all these signs --natural catastrophes, wars, pestilences, even human hatred - somehow, in some strange but real way, we are to know that God is near - “at the very gates” of our personal, national, and international lives.

But how do I recognize God? How utterly sad it would be to live one’s whole life and not be able to recognize the God who is near - at the gates!

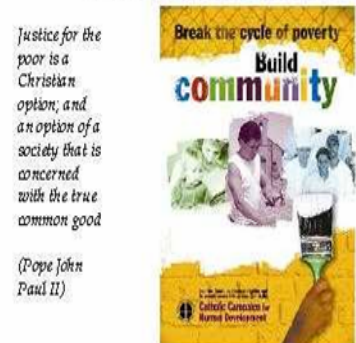

Hearing the Word of God

The words of Sacred Scripture are unlike any other that we ever hear. God reveals himself to us through the Scriptures. We believe that all of Scripture is inspired by the Holy Spirit and must be revered as truly being God's Word. In hearing God's Word, we come to know the depth of his love for us and our responsibilities as followers of Jesus.

There are three Scripture readings at Sunday Mass, taken from both the Old and New Testaments. The first reading, for most of the year, is from the Old Testament, which reminds us that throughout history God has been at work saving his people. During the Easter Season, the first reading is taken from the Acts of the Apostles, which recalls the growth and mission work of the early Church. The second reading, always from the New Testament, is taken from a letter from one of the Apostles or from the Book of Revelation. The third reading from one of the four Gospels, is the high point of the Liturgy of the Word. The Gospels are the fullest expression of God's revelation in Christ. The Gospel reading is so central, in fact, that it is proclaimed from a different book than the other readings. This book—the Book of the Gospels—is the one that is solemnly carried in procession at the start of the Mass, not the Lectionary that is used for the other readings. The book is placed flat on the altar until the Gospel is proclaimed by the priest or deacon; the deacon who reads the Gospel asks a blessing by way of preparation; the priest celebrant who reads the Gospel bows before the altar praying to be worthy to proclaim it. We may surround the Gospel with candles and incense. We stand to hear the Gospel. We sign our foreheads, lips, and hearts with the cross, praying that the Gospel will remain in our minds, on our lips, and in our hearts. The priest or deacon kisses the Gospel book after proclaiming the text. Through these gestures and signs of respect, the Church pays homage to Christ who is present when his Word is proclaimed.

The proclamation of the Scriptures in the Mass calls us to respond in faith. Through speech and song, posture and gesture, in silent meditation and, most important of all, by listening attentively to the Scriptures as they are proclaimed, we open our lives to God's Word. We pray that the Holy Spirit may make God's Word effective in our lives so that we will "Be doers of the word and not hearers only." (James 1:22)

Our full, conscious, and active participation is required if the Word of God is to find a home in us. We make the ritual responses, "Thanks be to God," and "Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ." We respond to the first reading by singing the Responsorial Psalm, and we sing the acclamation before the proclamation of the Gospel.

When the Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself is speaking to his people and Christ, present in his own word, is proclaiming the Gospel (General Instruction, n. 29)

In the hearing of God's word the Church is built up and grows, and in the signs of the liturgical celebration God's wonderful past works in the history of salvation are presented anew as mysterious realities. (Introduction to the Lectionary, n. 7)

We listen attentively as the reader, priest, or deacon proclaims God's Word. We listen as if Christ himself were standing at the ambo, for in fact it is God who speaks when the Scriptures are proclaimed.

It is beneficial to prepare ourselves for a fruitful hearing of the Scriptures. In his instruction, *Dies Domini*, Pope John Paul II encourages "those who take part in the Eucharist, priest, ministers, and faithful . . . to prepare the Sunday liturgy, reflecting the Word of God which will be proclaimed." The Holy Father adds that if we do not, "it is difficult for the liturgical proclamation of the Word of God alone to produce the fruit we might expect" (n. 40).

The Liturgy of the Word also includes the homily, which helps us understand the meaning of the Scriptures and other Mass texts, more closely connecting God's Word and the texts to our daily lives. Because the homily is a liturgical action and is given by the priest or deacon, it may not be omitted on Sundays and Holy Days. After we recite the Creed together, the Prayers of the Faith-

ful conclude the Liturgy of the Word as the community, moved by the inspired Word of God, prays for the needs of the whole Church, the world, and the local community.

The twofold table of God's Word and Eucharist continues to spiritually nourish the Church. "In the word of God the divine covenant is announced; in the Eucharist the new and everlasting covenant is renewed." (*Introduction to the Lectionary*, n. 10) God's Word leads us to the Eucharistic table where we enter the mighty deeds of God and especially the saving death and resurrection of Jesus. By uniting ourselves to Jesus in his self-offering to the Father, we are drawn more deeply into the life of God.

Meditative Silence

The General Instruction calls for periods of meditative silence in the Mass, especially in the Liturgy of the Word: *The Liturgy of the Word is to be celebrated in such a way as to promote meditation, and so any sort of haste that hinders recollection must clearly be avoided . . . it is also appropriate to include brief periods of silence . . . in which, at the prompting of the Holy Spirit, the word of God may be grasped by the heart and a response through prayer may be prepared.* (n. 56)
