Father Phil's Ramblings

Due to the fact that articles for future bulletins during the Christmas season must be submitted weeks in advance, I am writing this in mid-December.

Christmas isn't here yet and the Kings have not yet appeared, but you are reading this on Epiphany Sunday. I could either write about my favorite Three Kings story, or share with you two interesting letters I received from parishioners. My favorite Wise Men story, I will save for my homily on Sunday, January 4th.

The two letters from parishioners concerned themselves with some of the recent liturgical changes and how people could become more participatory. The first letter complimented our music director, Margie Shiel, saying what a wonderful job she does. I am sure that all of us would second that opinion. Margie makes great and beautiful music for all of our liturgies, but the note rather humorously suggested that people would sing much better if we sang Christmas carols during the season of Advent.

We all want to rush to Christmas, and Advent is our time for waiting. Yes, I agree, people love to sing Christmas carols. People are more familiar with the melodies and lyrics and the season of Christmas should excite those feelings that allow us to raise our voices in prayerful songs. But imagine if we sang Christmas carols throughout the year. Even the most devout of the faithful would get a bit tired of Christmas carols. With Margie's talents, she chooses music in keeping with the liturgical season. Hopefully, people will be able to sing those songs with the same zeal as they sing Christmas carols.

The second letter was written to encourage and offer suggestions for everyone to become more personally involved with the priest at the Consecration. A wonderful idea, but each and every member of our community must express their faith with their own words. Personal words of praise and love must come from the heart of each person. Saying these words will help deepen their love and respect for the Body of Christ.

I want to thank each of these parishioners for their concern and sincere desire to help make the Eucharist more meaningful and faith-filled.

"THE GENTILES ARE CO-HEIRS"

And St. Paul, writing to the predominantly non-Jewish Christian community in Ephesus, continues: "The Gentiles are members of the same body, and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the Good News."

The "gentiles." The term has various meanings in the Old and New Testaments. After the exile, the peoples who made up those subjected to the Egyptians came to be welded into the people of Israel, the Jewish nation. In Hebrew they referred to themselves as "am" in contrast to the "goyim" or those who were not ethnically Jews. In time, the term "gentiles" came to be a label denoting the non-Jews. It didn't just mean "non-Jew" but had attached to it a certain disdain as the "gentiles" were considered unclean, immoral, idolators, outside the pale of the covenant Yahweh had made with the Israelites.

In the Old Testament and New the term "gentile" is used to indicate people outside the Promise. To have contact with such people was to make the Jew unclean. Even Jesus, a man of His own time and culture, uses the term to indicate outcastes and people of suspect integrity. Some of the most powerful incidents in the Gospels involve gentiles as the recipients of a miracle or the praise of Jesus.

But Paul, at one time himself so much the "ultra-Israelite," sees by the power of the Spirit of the Risen Lord that: "The Gentiles are members of the same body, co-partners in the promise..." What must it have taken for Paul to arrive at that conclusion? How was the very Jewish heart of Paul opened to the reality of God's universal salvific will to save the whole of humanity?

The acts of the Apostles depict Paul as turning to the gentiles in frustration at the hardness of heart of his own people. Are we to believe that Jesus was made available to the world because of Paul's pique—his irritation at the obstinacy of the Jews? God uses humans and the events of their lives to reveal His/Her will. God uses individuals and cultures and races to universally proclaim that the message of the "God-Good News" is needed for all, ALL peoples.

Who are today's "gentiles"; my personal "gentiles"? Who are the "outcastes" of my ordinary existence? Are there people whom I keep at "arm's length"—or better, "heart's length". Do I have the ethnic biases, racial biases, linguistic biases, educational biases, religious biases, economic biases, ideological biases, theological biases, Western biases, political biases, etc., etc.???

How easily I can segregate certain people from my love and friendship! Sometimes it may seem to us that Jesus and a political or social agenda which He went about preaching or demonstrating. But as Jesus became aware of the universality of His Father's love for all people, He relaxed and enjoyed people, all people. Though He might I have made reference to "gentiles" to bring a point home to His followers, Jesus surely began to experience His God-life as God-love for all peoples.

I'm sitting here trying to think of some "cute" way of summing all this up. It occurred to me that Jesus began His human life **IN** looking **OUT**. As time went on and He prayed and opened Himself to the Spirit, He discovered that He was **OUT** and looking **IN**. Then He discovered that there was **NO IN and NO OUT!**

Like magic! Now you see "gentiles"; now you don't!

St. Vincent De Paul Society

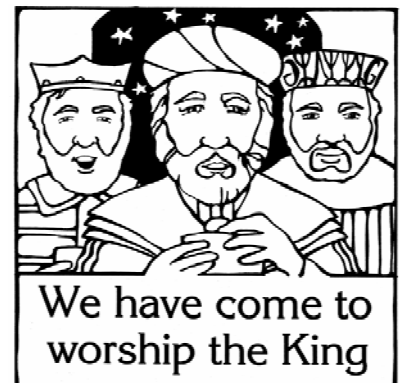
On Saturday, January 10 & 11th, our St. Vincent de Paul Society will be sponsoring a collection at Church to help LAMP (Latin America Medical Providers). This is a non-profit organization located at 578 Sunset Ridge Road in Northfield.

Physicians, nurses, pharmacists, a laboratory person, and lay people make a one-week trip to Guatemala. Each person pays his or her own transportation cost. They provide a 5-day open clinic and do general surgery while they are there.

Last year they saw 1,500 patients and performed 82 surgical procedures in five working days. People start lining up the day before they open and often line up during the week while they are there, hours before the clinic opens. Many people walk a great distance to receive care.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Wednesday of this week is Christmas Day in Russia, and in much of the Orthodox world. This curious difference in schedule has a lot to do with how calendars have been developed and changed over the years. In the year 45 b.c., Julius Caesar gave the empire his Julian Calendar, with the winter solstice on January 6. This put an end to a system in which officials called "pontiffs" were able to tweak the calendar by adding extra days in as needed. He invented two new months at that time, December and January; and in order to correct the mess the pontiffs had made, forced a year of 445 days on the empire in what he named "The Last Year of Confusion." The new months varied in number of days according to a complex schedule, but the calendar was still off by nearly twelve minutes a year, and lost a full day every 130 years.

Pope Gregory XIII reformed the calendar in 1583, but not everyone appreciated his efforts. England held out for two hundred years. 1700 was a leap year in England, but not in France; they were eleven days apart! George Washington was really born on February 11; when the Gregorian calendar was finally adopted in the English colonies shortly before the Revolution, he had to move his birthday to February 22. Now the calendars are thirteen days apart, which accounts for Russia's Julian calendar Christmas. And Caesar thought he had brought confusion to an end!

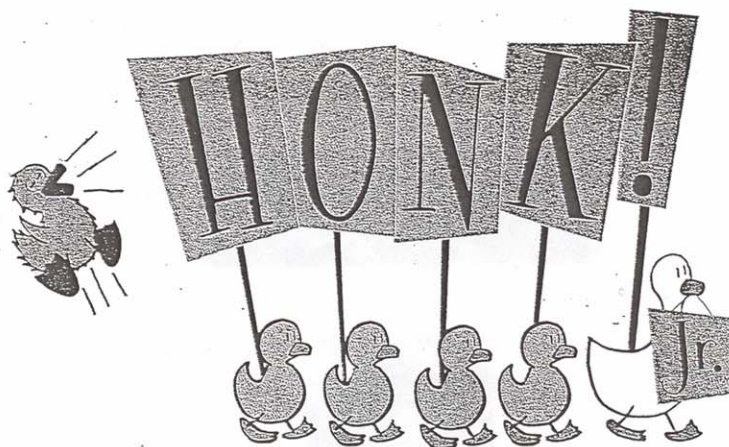
