Father Phil and I are inviting you and your wife or husband to an open group session which will begin on April 21st, and take place in the Parish Center at 7200 N. Osceola.

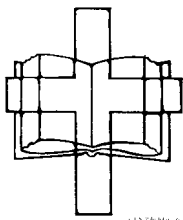
There will be four different sessions during which we will be discussing a range of topics dealing and affecting police officers and their families.

## Father Phil's Ramblings

### Wasting Time With God

In our busy day do we take time to "Waste Time" with God. I believe it is good to look at our day and examine our use of time. Otherwise there is a real danger that we will drift through life, pleasantly but perhaps, aimlessly.

A man who woke to the fact that he was spending hours at a bar, watching T.V. and neglecting his family decided to change his ways.

Now that man spends a little time each morning in quiet reflection and does what he calls his "if only". He imagines it is the end of the day and thinks "if only"... I had taken the children for a walk...if only I had written the letter to that sick friend...if only I had told my wife how much she means to me. He then spent the rest of the day doing the things on his "if only list". He lives with the energy that comes from accepting and using well the wonderful gifts that God gives him.

The Church is definitely in the "RCIA Mode" as we approach Easter. What's that again...RCIA? Oh, you forgot again, did you? Well, it means the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults. Last week Eric Garrison and Jeneen Shipman did a wonderful job of introducing themselves to you all. There's one more "seeker".

### Chuck writes:

*"My name is Charles Vosburgh, and I live with my wife Mary Grant in Niles. I have a daughter who is expecting her first child in September, and a son who lives and works in Wheaton.*



*Religion means 'to bind fast,' which for us Christians I take as meaning the person-to-person connection with God. Mary and most of my friends are Catholic, and I have attended mass with them often. Over the years I have grown to realize that the way Catholics use the senses in celebrating the sacraments helps me to better feel this connection with God. The kneeling, genuflection, holy water, statues, incense, candles and rosaries all strengthen this 'connection to God,' and makes me want to be a member of the Catholic community, and of St. Juliana Parish."*

Isn't it wonderful to have people like Chuck, Eric, and Jeneen in our family? They help us to see with clear eyes, hear with a renewed acuity, and feel the wonders of our Catholic Christian tradition. It has been an enriching experience being with them these past many weeks of our program.

Here's a good example of what I mean. Last week, before the 9:00 am Eucharist at which we introduced the RCIA participants and their families, Chuck asked me: "Why is there no water in the holy water fonts?" I explained that it's part of the penitential spirit of the Lenten season. But that it's also to build up our anticipation for the Baptismal ritual of Holy Saturday night. It also has the very simple effect of getting people to think about Lent and the Easter Mysteries: "Hey! Where's the holy water?" It breaks up our normal ordinary-time-of-the-year routine and draws attention to the Lenten time.

Yes, Chuck certainly has a beautiful insight when he refers to the "sensible" aspect of our Faith. It's a meaningful way to experience the Incarnation in our very selves, in our bodies and in our hearts and minds. That can give us all pause to reflect on how we use our senses at the Liturgy and in prayer. It really is so important how we sit or stand or kneel, how we listen to the Word of God (or if we are readers, how we are proclaiming the Word - with devotion, with clarity, intelligibly?).

During the Eucharist Jesus says: "This is my body." In a very real way, we also say to Jesus: "This is my body which I use to worship You in Spirit and in Truth."

As I sit here and share these reflections with you, I find that spontaneously a prayer of St. Ignatius of Loyola comes to mind: "Take, Lord, and receive all my liberty, my memory, my understanding, and my entire will, all that I have and possess. You have given it all to me. To you, O Lord, I return it. All is yours, dispose of it wholly according to your will. Give me your love and your grace for this is sufficient for me."

### Saying "Yes"



This Thursday, March 25th is the Solemnity of the Annunciation

of the Lord. Nine months before Christmas the church commemorates the angel Gabriel's appearance to Mary at Nazareth. The Church celebrates Mary's saying "yes" to God's invitation to be the mother of Jesus and the subsequent incarnation of Jesus in Mary's womb by the power of the Holy Spirit. One of the things we learn from reflecting on Mary is that she understood that God can do infinitely more with us and through us when we say "yes" than if we say "no".

The truth should not be lost on us that the birth of Jesus was made possible by a young girl's trust in God's goodness and love even when she may have been overwhelmed by what God asked of her. The truth is that every child's birth begins with a mother saying "yes"; "yes" to welcoming a new life from God, "yes" to her own life being forever changed by the child she carries in her womb. This Thursday, let us pray for generous hearts, that God's invitation to parenthood may be met with love, trust and a "yes" to sharing life.

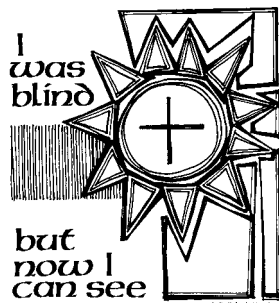

## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today, "Laetare Sunday," breaks the somberness of Lent for a little rejoicing, and the readings all summon us to an awareness of reconciliation. One of the best-loved stories of our tradition is today's Gospel story of the runaway son and the prodigal father. Prodigal, of course, is an adjective meaning "spendthrift or extravagant to a degree bordering on recklessness," and although the boy maxes out the credit cards, it is really the father who is prodigal with forgiveness.

Part of the excitement of this Laetare Sunday is rooted in the ancient catechumenate. Long ago, midway through Lent, the "Elect" were focusing more and more on the gift of reconciliation accomplished for them by Christ and about to be realized in the Easter sacraments they were preparing to celebrate. In some places, the Elect were even bedecked with roses on this day. A person bedecked with roses sticks out in a crowd; a person formed by the Eucharist and committed to living a life of reconciliation does, too. That's you!

## Fourth Sunday of Lent - "Remain In My Love"



Jesus tells the story of the forgiving father. The father's younger son takes his inheritance, moves from the family farm into the city where he spends all his money on wild living. The young man ends up in a pitiable state, taking a job feeding pigs, desperately hungry, but not even allowed by his masters to eat any of the food that he feeds to their pigs. Coming to his senses, he returns home and begs his father's forgiveness. The father, who has never stopped loving his younger son, throws a party to celebrate.

The father's older son is furious. After all, he has stayed at home and worked on the farm. "For years I have slaved for you," he complains. Although he has done the right thing, he resents it.

The father's love for his older son is clear too. "Everything I have is yours," he says. "But your brother has been lost to us and is now found. So of course, we have to celebrate."

The father in Jesus' story, of course, is our generous Father in heaven, who loves us all, who is willing to forgive everyone who asks for his forgiveness.

**Living the Word:** Pray: "Father, in this Lenten season of growing, help me to be generous with my forgiveness. Give me the humility to ask for your forgiveness and for the forgiveness of all those whom I have offended."

### The St. Joseph Table

According to legend, the St. Joseph Table originated in Sicily several centuries ago during a period of severe drought and famine. The people were starving and all they could grow were fava beans. In desperation they prayed to St. Joseph, the protector of the Holy Family. He answered their prayers by sending good rains and an abundant harvest to end the famine. To thank and honor St. Joseph, the people built altars consisting of grains, fruits, vegetables, seafood and wine. The food was served to the poor and shared to prayer and festivity. As the Italian people migrated to the New World, they brought with them their unique and beautiful tradition that is carried on in homes and churches throughout the United States today.

St. Juliana Parish is hosting its annual St. Joseph Table on this **Sunday, March 21st from 1:00 pm until 4:30 pm**. Last year our table fed over 700 people and all surplus food was taken to feed the poor.

The St. Joseph Table is based on donations of meatless dishes such as: fish, lasagna, ravioli, eggplant parmesan, gnocchi verdi, pizza, fried vegetables, manicotti, various pastries (cakes, cookies) and many specialty recipes.
