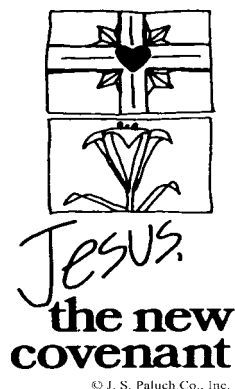

Help us to rededicate ourselves to that ongoing struggle for justice and peace. Help us to freely and wholeheartedly to give our lives to that task. Centuries ago, you called Mohammed from his caravan trade in order to inspire new generations with a vision of unity and hope. He too, gave his life to that task. Help us always to be hopeful people. Throughout the centuries, you have called countless, ordinary women and men away from their customary occupations in order to provide leadership for others who needed them. They gave their lives to that task. Help us to hear and heed your call, O God, and follow faithfully in their footsteps.

And so we offer this prayer to you, O, God, the creator and sustainer of this universe who dwells deep within our hearts forever and ever. Amen.

"The Mind of a Sage Appreciates Proverbs"

The Holy Father's General Intention for the month of September is: **OLD PEOPLE ARE AN ASSET FOR SOCIETY.** He goes on to clarify that by adding: That old people may be considered an asset for the spiritual and human growth of society.

The word "old" is not a very popular description of a person or a thing these days. Unless, of course, one is dealing with antiques (cf. "The Antique Road Show", etc.). There is some point in time when one passes from young or middle aged into the foggy realm of "the old." People are encouraged to avoid that passage as long as possible. There are diets, exercise-programs, seminars, spas to put off that encounter with being old.

To say: "I feel old; I just can't understand what these youngsters are talking about; I've been left behind," is socially unacceptable - especially in a society where being an "elder" has so many negative connotations connected with it. If you feel old, it must be due to the fact that you have indulged yourself over the years, have not taken proper care of yourself. If only you see the right doctor, eat the right food, do the right kind of exercise for the right amount of time a right number of days of the week, there is no reason why you should "feel old."

"Hey! I'm not growing old! I'm 'mellowing'." We have invented a vocabulary which avoids some of life's most obvious realities. We do not "die" we "pass away." We do not "feel sick"; we are "under the weather or having a bad day." We are not "angry"; we are "dealing with issues."

"Old people are an asset for society." Yeah, sure! Does being an "asset for society" ever stop? Is it the same as "being productive"? Is there a time of life when we cease being assets and become "burdens" for society? Is that why people are afraid to admit they are old? Is there a kind of subliminal fear that society might decide to discard the old as no longer contributing to the cause of society?

When people begin to dislike looking after the aged, even in their own families; when the young are no longer encouraged to spend time - perhaps even large amount of time - with the elderly; when being sick or infirm is looked on as a "curse" or , at best, a serious inconvenience for the young in the family, then, WISDOM has effectively lost its most sagacious voice. Unfortunately, we often equate "old" with "not-up-to-date," "reactionary," unable to cope with the problems of the "modern world." We unconsciously buy the modern proverb: "New problems require new solutions!"

WISDOM, unfortunately, does not "stick out like a sore thumb." She is hidden in the minds, hearts and experiences of the old - the sages who live in our families and next door to us and down the block. They know the true values of life. They may, at first glance, seem to be "out of date," because they move slowly or with canes or walkers. They may not resonate to modern slang of the "latest this or that." But they are our wisdom - figures (modern T.V. might call them "wisdom-icons"! They are not the "left-overs" of life but the fine "aged wine", tested and tasted and not found lacking.

Yes, "old people are an asset to society."

Am I saying this because I'm 64?!!

FYI - St. Juliana Parish - On The Cutting Edge

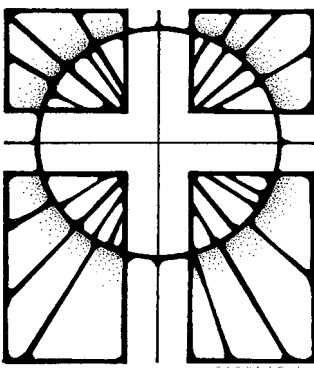
Governor Rod Blagojevich has signed a law requiring defibrillators in physical fitness facilities.

He also signed legislation to require health clubs, school gymnasiums, and indoor park district facilities to have an automatic external defibrillator (AED) on the premises and have staff trained in its use.

On December 9, 2003, thanks to the generosity of many parishioners, the Entertainment Book fundraiser and Parish Health Coordinator, Cindy Brennan's professional advise, and Father Phil's approval, the AED (automatic external defibrillator) was purchased for the Parish Activity Center. Cindy scheduled and executed training sessions immediately upon obtaining the AED.
