My priestly journey continued when I applied for the pastorate at Queen of Angels. After 6 years at Immaculate Conception I felt I needed another challenge. I was saddened at the closing of our small school, and when the opportunity to become pastor at Queen of Angels, which had a very large, ethnically-diverse school, was offered to me, I eagerly accepted. I left IC with this wonderful message from the parishioners: "No love or no friendship can ever cross our path without affecting us forever." I truly believe those words and they mean everything to me. I have been truly blessed in each and every assignment I have served, and love and friendship are most dear to me.

At Queen of Angels, the school was large and very diverse, both racially and ethnically. The parish was made up of three large communities: Irish-German, Hispanic, and Korean. To balance and serve each of these constituencies was very demanding. Queen of Angels was the most challenging of my assignments, and the one I probably fulfilled the least successfully. I knew no Korean, and little -- very little -- Spanish, hence I probably served the English-speaking community with the most success.

Queen of Angels held two weekly Bingo sessions, and one gigantic annual carnival which ran for ten days. In running a parish carnival one must be a bit like a circus clown, and juggle 3 or 4 balls for 10 straight days. Fun, yes, but exhausting, too. The present pastor, Father Bill O'Brien, has since cancelled the carnival. A wise man, but a man who will miss out on being a clown. Another fund-raising venture I initiated was the sale of Christmas trees. Now that was fun, and much less demanding. Parishioners volunteered to run the lot from the day after Thanksgiving until December 23rd. Christmas tree sales is a very profitable venture.

I spent 10 years at Queen of Angels and have many wonderful memories of faith-filled people who loved the Church and loved their God. Being a pilgrim, however, I knew it was time to move on. My final move -- next week.

"The Person who is Trustworthy in Very Small Matters Is Also Trustworthy in Great Ones!"

And the Good News goes on with the obverse: "And the person who is dishonest in very small matters is also dishonest in great ones."

What are these "small matters" and "great matters"? Are they the same as: blue-collar and white-collar matters, or indigent matters and well-off matters, or public school matters and Catholic school matters, or those-people-who-live-far-away-from-us matters and those-people-who-live-close-to-us-matters, or black matters and white matters, or fun matters and serious matters - Oh my!-I could go on all day! - Just what are "great" and "small" matters?

Everyone and everything starts out being a "small matter," don't they? That leads us to the important question: what are the "great matters" in my life at the moment? If I could answer that with honesty and truthfulness, I'd be way ahead of the game, believe me. The problem is that others keep telling me what should be important to me. And sometimes the strident voices around me drown out my own inner voice or distort it.

Maybe the world around is telling me the difference between small and great matters and my inner voice sounds like Jiminy Cricket chirping in a field of tall grass. I was out in Morton's Arboretum the other day and I barely-just-barely heard a sound which upon closer observation turned out to be a frog, a lilla fwog. The message was clear: I had to stop, attune my ears, not rustle the tall grass in which I was standing, and abstract the car-noises from the nearby highways and turn them off.

It was a lot like prayer.

It is possible that small matters are really great ones and what seem to be great matters are really small ones. The secret is in the discernment. What should I focus on? What should I invest my energies in? What should I spend time on as individual and with my family? Who are the important people in my life, the ones I spend the most time with, or the ones I spend my quality-time with? Is my quality-time a "small amount" or a "great amount"?

Did you ever reflect on the motley band of "small" people whom Jesus chose to be "His inner circle, His groupies"? What a disproportionate amount of time He spent with them in comparison with the "great ones" of the day! Or so it seems to me.

Jesus prayed quite a bit because He was always faced with discernments of one sort or another. There was no one around to tell Him how God is when God becomes human. Not even the Father knew the lived experience of being human except through Jesus. The "small things" and the "great things" could only be learned by the living of them. What effect did they have on the heart? Peace, consolation, joy, the fruits of the Holy Spirit: these are the touchstones of what is great and what is small in life. God is found in the great and small events and people of life, but God must be recognized, searched for, listened to.

God is like a frog in the grass.

Upon Further Review...

Last November, our parish implemented several changes in the mass required by the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM). For instance, the instruction called for more silence at various moments during the Eucharist, encouraged the procession with the Book of the Gospels and asked that we bow before receiving Holy Communion. There was, however, one requirement that we missed regarding an important gesture. The instruction calls for the people to stand at the point the priest says, " Pray brothers and sisters that our sacrifice..." Thus the people are already standing before they respond: "May the Lord accept this sacrifice..."

What is the significance of the gesture of standing at that time? In Catholic liturgy the proper position for praying to God is the standing position. Even in certain rituals when a priest or bishop has been kneeling (e.g. Good Friday, ordination rites) he always stands when he addresses a prayer to God. When the assembly offers their response: "May the Lord accept this sacrifice...", their words are also a prayer, said in response to the priests' invitation "pray, brothers and sisters". Thus the people are asked to stand at this point so that we are consistent in standing when we are praying in the liturgy.

The parish priests and staff ask that we begin doing this gesture together beginning the weekend of September 25th/26th. We thank you for your prayerfulness and the opportunity to share the Eucharist together in Christ.




