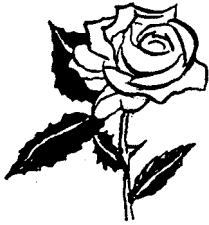

## Father Phil's Ramblings

(A continued Rambling)

In June of 1995, I arrived at St. Juliana Parish. I was a bit apprehensive because I knew no one and I was following Fr. Donald Ahearn, who had been pastor here for 20 years. I must confess that it took me quite a while to feel at ease and I imagine some parishioners felt the same about me. After a year or so I began to get to know you, you began to get to know me, and learned that my bark is generally much louder than my bite.

Much of the staff had been here for many years, and a new pastor was probably a challenging experience for many of them as well. Within three months of my arrival here, Fr. John Carolan left, and within a year and a half, Fr. Art Fagan and Fr. Scott Donohue left for other parishes. So many changes in such a short period of time.

Any kind of change can be a threatening experience. I am sure that I made many changes during my nine years at St. Juliana. One that I am especially proud of is the formation of the Christ Renews His Parish program. Also formed during my pastorate were the parish council and parish finance committee. Both are very important in meeting the needs of a large parish post-Vatican II.

One area that I NEVER thought I would be part of was the construction of new buildings and the raising of funds to pay for them. In the last four years, the construction of the Ahearn Parish Activity Center and the new rectory became a reality through the generous gifts of the parishioners, and the wisdom of both the Project 2000 committee and our finance committee.

What I am most pleased with is the fostering and building of the Christian family of St. Juliana Parish. We struggle, but our faith and our love, which is strengthened through the Eucharist, make Juliana's a wonderful place to be pastor. I thank you for your love and acceptance, and for your generous spirit of service. I am humbled to be pastor at St. Juliana.

In 2005, I will be retired. I will be 70 years old in 2005 and priests are required to retire at that age. To be retired from being pastor is one thing; to me, that means NO MORE MEETINGS. I will still very much remain a priest. A priest who celebrates the Eucharist, baptizes, witnesses marriages and celebrates and prays for all who have died.

As I enter my last year as pastor here, pray for me as I always do for you. God bless you!

## Wait With Faith

"How long, O Lord? I cry for help but you do not listen!"

And the Lord answers: "Write down the vision clearly upon the tablets, so that one can read it readily. For the vision still has its time, presses on to fulfillment, and will not disappoint; if it delays, wait for it, it will surely come, it will not be late. The rash one has no integrity; but the just one, because of his faith, shall live."

What is this "vision" that the Lord tells the Prophet Habakkuk to write down? Is it akin to Martin Luther King's "dream"? Is it akin to Mahatma Gandhi's non-violent "dream"? Or perhaps the "dream" of Francis of Assisi?

Joseph of the many-colored-cloak was accused by his own kinsmen of being a "dreamer." There's even an expression in English which we use when someone is speaking of some outcome which we feel is impossible: "Yeah, fella! In your dreams!" But dreams are akin to the vision the Lord speaks of to Habakkuk. Sometimes the only way God can cut through all the "reality" noise and flashing lights of our lives is to encounter us in dreams, in visions.

Psychologists who help people work with their dreams, often suggest that we write them down while they are still fresh in our consciousness. That's not so easy to do, but one can get adept at it with practice. The idea is that often we communicate with our deepest feelings, be they fears, apprehensions about the future, or even great joy, through dreams, when our defense mechanisms are not operating.

Sometimes, on a conscious level, we cannot think of peace, acceptance of all peoples as brothers and sisters, universal sharing of the goods of the world, equality of races, etc. What is "real" seems to be war, prejudice, selfishness, and hatred - or, as Habakkuk puts it: "why do you let me see ruin, O Lord; why must I look at misery? Destruction and violence are before me; there is strife, and clamorous discord."

But the Lord reminds the prophet of some original, primordial "vision" which still presses on to fulfillment and will not disappoint. Perhaps we shall find that vision in our own dreams and longings and hopes for ourselves and our families and the entire universe! Perhaps we have to get into "dream-like" states of heart and mind in order to get in touch with the visions implanted in us at the very moment of our conception.

Is it possible that prayer would be a conscious way of connection with that dream, that vision? Is it possible that contemplation is what the world needs at the moment in order to connect with God's vision of the world, the vision which still has its time, presses on to fulfillment, and will not disappoint?

There is no quick - "instant" - way to engage in contemplative prayer. It takes silence, leisure-time, awareness of all that is inward and outward. It is, in a way, like "dream-time." In dreams we have no conscious control of time or where it will lead us. So too contemplative prayer.

If someone were to ask: "Teach me to contemplate," they might just as well ask: "Teach me to breath."

May the Lord who frees you from sin, save you and raise you up."***

### Who Can Be Anointed?

- Those who are seriously ill.
- Those who are temporarily ill.
- Those who are chronically ill. (heart condition, asthma, arthritis...)
- Those who are emotionally troubled.
- Those who are over 65 years of age.
- Those who are preparing for surgery in the near future.
- Sick children who have reached the age of reason.

## Respect Life Sunday

Do you ever get discouraged? Have you ever looked back on all the work you've done to end abortion, to protect every human life from violence, and wondered why there are still laws which allow killing mothers who abort, and people who die at the hand of the state? On those days, when you're feeling sorry for yourself, you have a friend in Habakkuk: "How long, O Lord?" he laments loudly: "I cry for help but you do not listen! I cry out to you, 'Violence!' But you do not intervene. Why do you let me see ruin: why do I look at misery?"

Habakkuk lived at a time when Israel was in exile and had to live among a foreign people who hated them. He and the faithful few tried to continue to do God's will against terrible odds, but sometimes became so discouraged that they thought that God was not doing his part. To Habakkuk and to us, the Lord responds:

"The vision still has its time!" Not my time. Not your time. But God's time. The day when all little babies will be safe in their mothers' wombs will come! The day when old men and dying women are cherished as God's most precious gifts, will come! The day when every human life from the first moment of conception to the last natural breath will be protected and nourished and respected - that day will come...God's day will come! "If it delays," God says, "wait for it. It will surely come, it will not be late."

Sometimes we get high and mighty, following our own agenda rather than trying to discern God's will. But, Jesus tells us to remember that at the end of the day we can have but one best boast: "we are unprofitable servants; who have done what we were supposed to do."

Certainly we are called to work for the Kingdom of God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength. Certainly we are to preach the Gospel of Life with every resource at our disposal. Certainly we are to "stir into flame the gift God gave us." But in the end, this great work of defending human life is not our work; it is the work of God!

God, give us the patient endurance to carry on! Give us the hope to know you will win the victory! And give us the faith to trust only in you, the author and keeper of the Gospel of Life.

Blood, commonly referred to as the "gift of life" truly is just that. Blood carries gases, nutrients and waste products through the body. Blood also fights infections, heals wounds and performs many other vital functions. We all need blood to survive. There is no substitute. Volunteer donors are the only source for people who need it.

**Who does your blood help?** Donated blood is used for victims of car accidents, burn victims, patients with anemia, bone marrow and stem cell transplants, organ transplants, cancer patients and many other traumas and blood-related disorders. LifeSource provides blood to the hospitals, which then provide to patients in need.

**Most adults are medically eligible to give blood.** There are actually only a few medications or medical conditions that will keep you from being able to give. Blood donors all types are urgently needed. Blood can be donated every 56 days (8 weeks). All donors must:

- be in good physical health
- Be at least 17 years old (16 with written consent)
- Weigh at least 110 pounds
- Be free from cold or flu symptoms

**News From Grade 3 – September 2004**

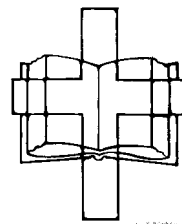
