## Parish Communal Anointing of the Sick Mass

Sunday, October 10th  
at the Noon Mass

On Sunday, October 10th, we will celebrate the communal Anointing of the Sick at the noon Mass.

The actual anointing will take place after the homily. The priest first lays his hands on the person's head, asking the Holy Spirit to come down upon those who are sick, to strengthen them, and then anoints them on the forehead and on the hands, saying: *"Through this holy anointing may the Lord in His love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. May the Lord who frees you from sin, save you and raise you up."*

### Who Can Be Anointed?

- Those who are seriously ill.
- Those who are temporarily ill.
- Those who are chronically ill. (heart condition, asthma, arthritis...)
- Those who are emotionally troubled.
- Those who are over 65 years of age.
- Those who are preparing for surgery in the near future.
- Sick children who have reached the age of reason.

## THE WORD OF GOD UNCHAINED

There is no chaining the word of God! But how many times do we attempt to do that very thing? Had the followers of Jesus or the teachers of the Law or the Pharisees been asked if the lepers should be cleansed or healed, the answer would most likely have been, "No, they deserve their condition."

The lepers would have been, perhaps, a mixed group: Galileans and Samaritans alike, the bond of their awful disease overcoming the pettiness of former religious bickering. Jesus' actions once again illustrate his vocation and ours: to reach out when healing is needed, to challenge when conversion is needed, to console when comfort is needed. He also follows his own advice from last week's Gospel: do what you have been commanded to do. When the cleansed Samaritan has returned to give thanks, Jesus does not take it as an opportunity for self-aggrandizement, but rather offers insight into faith.

## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Christian liturgy has always contained an opportunity to make a choice for sharing. From the beginning, Christians pooled their resources, especially for the care of widows and orphans, at the weekly Eucharist. Over the years, the collection became detached from the liturgy and baskets or plates would be passed through the community while the Mass was going on at the altar, or collected at the doors. In Milan's Ambrosian Rite, these gifts have always brought to the altar by lay people in procession. In German countries, the ancient custom was for the entire assembly to process with their gifts--first the men, then the women, then the priests and deacons--to offer their gifts at the altar. The old ceremony of canonization included a curious vestige of this procession: people would present the pope with two loaves of bread, two barrels of wine and water, five candles, and three cages containing pigeons or turtle-doves!

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## “Got a Little Bit of a Potbelly There, Bob!”

There's a friend of mine who from his school days has been as thin as the proverbial rail. Whenever he sees me, he'll smile, gently lay a finger on my substantial stomach and remind me that I'm carrying too much weight around. At first, it was a kind of "Hail-fellow-well-met" sort of a joke, but as it became a regular feature of our meetings, it began to irritate me, and, unfortunately, I let it be known that I didn't care to be reminded of what I myself already knew.

We have the lepers in today's Good News. Outcasts, they were from ordinary social intercourse. They were "unclean" and had to literally announce their physical nearness so that people could get out of their way - it being thought at the time that all forms of skin-diseases were communicable.

As in the Old and New Testamental times, society determined who were and who were not unclean. Often enough, this uncleanness was not based on any physical dirtiness or disease. Sometimes it had to do with religion, social status, color, educational qualifications, ancestry, or even whether a person washed their hands in a certain way!

In the Good News we see Jesus consistently cutting through the social taboos of His day. I can almost picture Him taking delight in choosing people over regulations, which tended to put people into categories. This does not mean Jesus was necessarily a social activist with a "reform-society-agenda." To put it simply, He did the obvious in each situation - that is to say, the humanly obvious course of action. Maybe it was something as simple as His saying to Himself: "Now, if I were in that person's shoes, how would I feel if...?"

Don't the American Indians have a saying which indicates that you really cannot understand someone - your enemy? - until you walk a distance in that person's moccasins? I think that Jesus had that experience par excellence. After all, what was the Mystery of the Incarnation except God walking in our "moccasins"? And in His human life, Jesus had this preeminent gift of reading hearts, especially the hearts of those in pain or embarrassment, or those cast out by society. His miracles of curing are not simply manifestation of power, revelations of His Divinity. They are acts of compassion and love for the individuals whom He touched.

We are called to be sensitive to each other's "ailments." That very sensitivity can "cure" people, make them whole. We live in a culture which, through the media, is always telling us what the "norm" is. Anything else is "ab-nor-mal." We are always afraid of not measuring up to the "norm." Our abnormalities may be varied; we might be obese or skinny, we might have a gap between our two front teeth, maybe we're "pigeon-toed" or flat-footed; we might be bald or potbellied; maybe our faces might be all shriveled up; maybe we were born with some kind of physical deformity; maybe we're deaf or suffer from heart disease; maybe we're black or white or purple or red; maybe we've got leprosy!

The point is: we can perform miracles of acceptance and compassion. There's no sense in disrupting the flow of life with "gaper's delay" when we see, hear or feel people different from ourselves. Sometimes, the greatest act of compassion is to take people for granted. You know what I mean, don't you? If not - ask me; I'll give you some more examples.

As Roy Rogers and Dale Evans used to sing: "Happy trails to you, till we meet again!"
