I wonder if He was hurt. Jesus has feelings too, you know. We can't say thank you enough. Then of course, we should be ever grateful to an All-Good God for His many blessings.

## Pray Always!

Yeah, sure! I was talking to a dad at the Homecoming the other week and we were bemoaning the fact that life is so treadmill-like. It seems there is no time to relax and just BE. With youngsters in the family the situation is even more difficult. There are some days it's a wonder we succeed in getting our meals in and a bit of personal recreation. "Pray always!" What monk thought that one up?!

Hey, how about "arrow-praying"? That might be just the thing we need in a busy schedule. "Arrow-praying": that's what it's called in the Hindi language - "thir winthee." A "thir" is an arrow. The imagery is apt, is it not? These are the brief, often poetically metered, prayers we're familiar with since our youth. We call them "ejaculations," prayers thrown out in the direction of God. In a world of "instant" this and "instant" that, we can easily understand the concept of "arrow-prayers." They are set to the strings of our hearts released to soar towards a loving, compassionate God. Handy little things, they are. Short, sleek, and poignant (in the original sense of that French word - "pointed").

"Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me!" An "arrow-prayer" speaks from heart to heart. It's free of frills and nuances and directly simple.

Some years ago the Western world rediscovered the "arrow prayer" by means of an anonymously authored book called: "The Way of the Pilgrim" which purported to be the spiritual diary of a Russian monk of many centuries ago. In this book, the beauty, simplicity, and power of the "arrow-prayer" was described and demonstrated. Repeated over and over again, this prayer could and apparently did lead many to a deep mysticism "Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me!"

Some people began calling it the "Jesus prayer."

The Prayers of the Rosary are based on this wonderful realization that prayer can create in a person peace and centeredness just by faith-filled and loving repetition. Ejaculatory prayer is like a "shout" in time of need or stress. But when repeated rhythmically and continuously, it is like the soft moaning of a soul in pain or the joyful humming of a soul content and trusting.

Coupled with rhythmic breathing from the diaphragm, this way of praying is very restful and tends to center us, even for a few moments in an otherwise hectic day. It can become as habitual as breathing itself - with spiritual benefits it is difficult to describe in words.

It's not a "new" technique. Nor is it the prayer of people who live in monasteries. Every culture, every religious denomination discovers it.

## SNOW SHOVELING



Every year we have a group of seventh and eighth graders from our school that volunteer to shovel snow. They eagerly sign up for this project in the fall and look forward to serving those in our parish who need their walks shoveled. Some questions asked when parishioners call are these: when will there be notification that a student is assigned, boys vs. girls shoveling snow, and is there is any kind of fee involved.

Mrs. Lidgus, a teacher at St. Juliana has been extremely generous with her time in gathering students who would like to shovel snow. In October she obtains a list of seventh and eighth graders who would like to provide this service.

When parishioners start calling about snow shoveling, students who live nearest to the parishioner are matched to provide the service. The student is asked to contact the parishioner before the snow falls and together arrangements are made as to when he/she should come to shovel. We cannot guarantee boys or girls to shovel snow. It is most disheartening when a student goes to make arrangements and are told they are not wanted because they are female and may not be strong enough to shovel. A student is usually assigned to shovel for one person. Please let us know if you have a large area to shovel, then two students will be assigned. Students shovel after school has ended for the day, they cannot come before the school day starts. If neighbors will be shoveling please let the student know so they can be put back on the snow shoveling list for someone who has no one to shovel for them.

Concerning our students getting paid: There is no fee for snow shoveling, however, parishioners who call want to give our students some kind of gratuity. This is strictly up to your discretion and should be discussed when the student contacts you.

Please note that it is impossible to have someone shovel for you on the day of a snow storm, on week ends or on holidays when students are not in school. It is important to be put on the snow shoveling list now, in fall, before the snow arrives.

## PERSISTENT PRAYER

To the best of our knowledge, the authors of the New Testament did not spend much time in each other's company following the Resurrection. They took their charge to go to the nations and spread the Good News seriously. Paul and Luke are an exception to this, having traveled together on missionary journeys. It is no accident, then, that perseverance in prayer is a favorite theme of both authors. Luke's Gospel (which speaks most frequently about Jesus' own prayer), Acts, and the Pauline letters all exhort us to unceasing prayer.

Paul's personality was certainly tenacious; he most likely would have admired the persistent widow in today's Gospel passage. The purpose of these passages is not to make us think--as infants and toddlers do--that if we keep asking or yelling or crying we will eventually get our way. No, the point is that when true disciples believe in something, we will persist in following that belief whether it is convenient or not, even when we come up against seemingly insurmountable obstacles.

## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Although the hours of daylight are rapidly dwindling, many people would say that these October days bring the year's most splendid weather. Americans are riders and joggers, not strollers, and so the pleasures of the season are often lost on us. This is not the case with many Jewish people, who observe an ancient rule in walking to synagogue on the Sabbath. On city streets and suburban sidewalks in many cities, we may notice around sunset the nicely dressed families walking and chatting on Friday afternoon. After a short prayer at dusk, the families stroll home again for a relaxing and festive meal. They return to synagogue in the morning, and then spend an afternoon in family leisure until three stars appear in the night sky and Sabbath ends.

-Catholics, on the other hand, pile into the car and drive even a short distance to Mass; some even divide the family to participate at different hours. For Jews, the leisurely walk marks a dividing line between hectic life commitments and a day of abundant joy and enrichment. Before we became an automobile culture, Catholics embraced a similar pace, and in most places walked to church. These lovely days of fall invite us to tap into an old and life-giving tradition. If you live within a mile of your church, walk next week. If you must drive, park at a good distance and walk the rest of the way. Talk about your life, greet strangers, notice the crunch of leaves under your shoes. You may be surprised at how different Sunday Mass feels when it is framed by leisure!

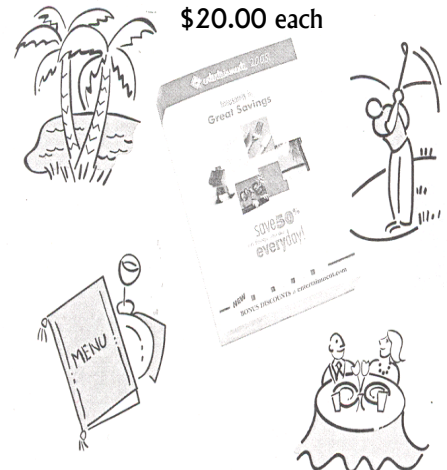
### Relevant Radio
