On June 15, 1995, I came to St. Juliana as pastor. I had most previously served as pastor at Queen of Angels and prior to that, Immaculate Conception (North Park.)

On June 30, 2005, I will retire. Upon reaching 70 years of age, every priest is required to retire from his role as pastor in the parish where he is currently assigned. On Friday, January 7th I met with Cardinal George and we mutually agreed on my retirement date, so it is now considered official.

It's been a wonderful 10 years, and over the past few months the thought of retirement has caused me to have mixed feelings. Some peaceful, others sorrowful. Many of you have told me that I can't leave, and maybe some (only a few, I hope!) are rather glad that I will step down as pastor.

I am looking forward to not having to worry about finances, building repairs, boiler failures, committee meetings, roof leaks, etc. I am looking forward to just being a parish priest, and serving people sacramentally, spiritually and personally. I am also looking forward to having time of my own, where I will not feel guilty to just enjoy life with good friends and family.

Many of you are probably curious about how and when a new pastor will be appointed to St. Juliana Parish. I believe we will find many good candidates to be interested in applying for the position. The priests' personnel board will be coordinating the process, and will schedule meetings with parish staff, as well as an open parish meeting. The date and time of the open parish meeting will be published and parishioners will be encouraged to attend and share their suggestions with the personnel board representatives.

Being the victim of prejudice because of your color is a terribly painful and frustrating experience. Not to mention demeaning.

Have I shared this with you? We had a dance band at St. Ignatius High School here in Chicago - I'm talking the early and late 50's - and one of our sax players was Wade Booker, a class-mate of my brother Phil's, no mean sax-man in his own right! Now Wade was black and a very fine young man and excellent horn-man. Besides, he was in all respects a gentleman - and gentle man.

One night, after a high school dance - could very well have been Christ the King parish where Father Andy Greely ran the teen club - the band gathered at the home of Dick Klarich to relax and snack. I remember the names and particulars since the event is etched indelibly in my memory. We had some music playing on the phonograph, which reminded me of the black dance group the Step Brothers. I began to pretend to tap dance and shouted out: "Hey, guys, look! Just like those niggers on T.V.!"

The word "nigger" was no sooner out of my mouth than I became painfully and vividly aware of Wade standing at a distance. I fumbled an apology, my face and neck burning with shame. It was no use: the word was in the air and nothing I could say or do could make it "unsaid." Oh, I went up to Wade and tried to say something to the effect that: "I didn't mean you." But then, who did I mean?

That was a turning-point in my life. In one terrible unintended insult, God had begun the conversion process. It would take years for me to understand the "gift" of that evening. First of all, Wade just passed off the remark - or so it seemed. But I shall never know how much pain it caused him.

Some ten years to the day, I would understand that prejudice "from the inside," as they say, when I would be the "white man" in India. So many times I wanted to make myself inconspicuous: I could speak Hindi almost flawlessly; I could culturally interact with people "just like them"; but I could not change my color. I bore with me wherever I went the history of the white man's presence in India - and the white man's prejudice and sense of superiority.

There was no way I could shout out to all : "No! I'm not like what you have experienced or heard about in your families!" I was a "GORA"; I was white.

And then I realized, deep down, the conversion begun years before was to a great extent, complete. As I reflect, it seems that America had this saintly man, Martin Luther King, Jr; I had India.

THE CATHOLIC CHURCH - HERE COMES EVERYBODY

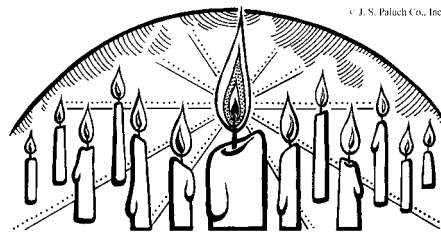

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

By Candlemas, forty days after Christmas, February 2, the season of Christ's coming has depleted our candle supply. Soon, the parish will order a new paschal candle from a catalogue or candle maker, or in some communities, wax will be collected to be melted and molded. Last year's paschal candle shows the wear and tear of summer heat, or many funerals or baptisms.

Paschal candles have been around since at least the fourth century, when Constantine's biographer Eusebius reported that the night of the sacred vigil was "transformed into the brilliancy of day, by lighting throughout the city pillars of wax, while burning lamps in every place so that the splendor of this night was brighter than the brightest daylight."

Light was a precious commodity in the ancient world, and this lavish use of precious beeswax was a sign of the Christian's call to bear Christ's light into the world's darkness. In a pre-electric age, a whole city aglow from the paschal flame must have been a glorious sight, and a reminder to every baptized Christian of our vocation to "be the light of the world."

3 Year Old and 4 Year Old Preschool

The **3 year old preschool** meets three days a week - Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, from 8:15 am until 10:40 am. All children must be 3 years of age by September 1, 2005.

Please bring the following items (*certificates will be copied and returned at later date*) **for each child you are registering:**

- Original Birth Certificate (with birth number) - for Illinois, the number is on the upper right side and begins with 112 - followed by the year the child was born - followed by additional numbers.
- Baptismal Certificate
- Child's Social Security Card
- \$75 nonrefundable registration fee per child
- Church envelope

Admission into the St. Juliana Preschool Program requires parent participation in the program approximately six times a year. A parent may substitute with grandparents or other relatives.

The **4 year old preschool** meets five days a week either mornings or afternoons. The morning session is from 8:15 am until 10:40 am. The afternoon session from 12:15 am until 2:40 pm. All children must be four years of age by September 1, 2005.

Children entering Kindergarten must be 5 years old by September 1, 2005; those entering first grade must be 6 years old by September 1, 2005; etc. The regular school day is 8:15 am until 2:40 pm. We offer a full-day and a half-day kindergarten program. Half-day students may be in the same classroom as the full-day students or in a half-day classroom. The number of students enrolled in the half-day program for a given year determines whether there will be a half-day classroom that year. Usually this decision is made by the end of June. Family tuition rates are available for families with more than one child attending St. Juliana School. New tuition rates will be available upon completion of the 2005-2006 parish budget process.

- Original Birth Certificate (with birth number) - for Illinois, the number is on the upper right side and begins with 112 - followed by the year the child was born - followed by additional numbers.
- Baptismal Certificate

- Church envelope
