Father Phil's Ramblings

January Inward - January Outward

Jesus calls us to follow Him. As Jesus called Peter, James and John to follow Him, He calls each of us. We are called to follow Him. Follow where? Where did Jesus lead us? On two journeys, not just one.

People generally seek God for one of two reasons. We either want to be comforted or we want to be empowered. Sometimes we come to Mass needing refuge from the world, rest from our weariness, and the quiet comfort of knowing that we are loved. At other times, we come needing a new sense of purpose, a challenge. Two reasons! Two journeys!

In the Gospel we hear Jesus say, "Come to me, all of you who are wearing and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest." But Jesus also said, "Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth; I have come to bring the sword."

The same Jesus that regularly went into quiet places also went out to take on the world's powers.

The same Jesus who invites us into the sanctuary also send us into the streets.

The journey inward is about experiencing a living God. But if it is the ONLY journey we make, it can be very self-centered.

I offer a suggestion. What if the journey inward and the journey outward are actually one single journey? The journey outward requires us to love other human beings as an expression of our love of God. Jesus once said, "Just as you did it to the least of them, you did it to me."

May our journey inward and our journey outward be one and the same!

"I Belong To Paul" ... "I Belong To Apollo" ...
"I Belong to Cephas" "I Belong to Christ"

Today is Ecumenical Sunday. The Church has traditionally set aside a week at the end of January to pray for the unity of Christians. But why just Christians? Why not the unity of all peoples? Last week we celebrated Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. Remember his famous "I Have a Dream" speech?

Maybe God has a "dream" too. I think at least once before I have used such imagery in one or other of my reflections. In a way, God has chosen to be limited by the very nature God has given us. God will not impose His/Her "dream" on us; a dream can only be shared - it cannot be imposed.

Almost from the beginning of our existence we are creatures who want to "belong". The desire becomes acute as we enter our pre-teens and teens. We want to dress alike, look alike (by not looking alike!), speak the same slang-ridden language, hang with the "guys", go to the same high school, be seen walking with the same friends, see the same films, etc. The need to "belong" becomes more sophisticated as we grow older. We want to work in "upwardly mobile circumstances"; we want "quality of life"; we want to be "successful" and have that success recognizable to others.

To belong, to be part of the team, to have a support group, to be "in" and not "out", to be "cool" and not "geeky."

Paul pleads with the Corinthians: "I urge you, brothers and sisters, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree in what you say, and that there be no division among you, but that you be united in the same mind and in the same purpose." Already in the early Church, Paul was sensing the human need to "belong" - and its opposite "to exclude." One way of belonging is to consciously exclude people who don't meet the standard of the group, for whatever reason: fashion, language, color, education, spirituality, notion of God (in the end, that's all everyone of us has is a "notion" of God Who is beyond our human imaginings and concepts!), or any other limit the human heart in need of belonging can devise.

Paul was shocked at how easily the Corinthians had begun to identify themselves by allegiance to their respective "gurus." "Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you?!" It is so utterly human. Had Paul perhaps forgotten his own fanatic attachment of his Jewish roots vis- a- vis the early beginnings of the Church?

We must constantly examine our allegiance to Jesus Christ. Has my "belonging" unintentionally, unconsciously become an "excluding" of any people? Is my faith in Jesus "open-armed" or is it "closed-fisted"? In other words, is my faith in Jesus **ECUMENICAL**? Do I stand open to all peoples of the world? Do I appreciate the workings of the Holy Spirit throughout all the times and places of human history?

Perhaps Paul's words to the Corinthians deserve some reflection and prayer on my part:

"Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? For Christ did not send me to baptize but to preach the gospel, and not with the wisdom of human eloquence, so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its meaning."

3 Year Old and 4 Year Old Preschool

The 3 year old preschool meets three days a week - Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, from 8:15 am until 10:40 am. All children must be 3 years of age by September 1, 2005.

Please bring the following items (*certificates will be copied and returned at later date*) **for each child you are registering:**

- Original Birth Certificate (with birth number) - for Illinois, the number is on the upper right side and begins with 112 - followed by the year the child was born - followed by additional numbers.
- Baptismal Certificate
- Child's Social Security Card
- \$75 nonrefundable registration fee per child
- Church envelope

Admission into the St. Juliana Preschool Program requires parent participation in the program approximately six times a year. A parent may substitute with grandparents or other relatives.

The 4 year old preschool meets five days a week either mornings or afternoons. The morning session is from 8:15 am until 10:40 am. The afternoon session from 12:15 am until 2:40 pm. All children must be four years of age by September 1, 2005.

Please bring the following items (*certificates will be copied and returned at a later date*) **for each child you are registering:**

- Original Birth Certificate (with birth number) - for Illinois, the number is on the upper right side and begins with 112 - followed by the year the child was born - followed by additional numbers.
- Baptismal Certificate
- Child's Social Security Card
- \$75 nonrefundable registration fee per child
- Church envelope

Admission into the St. Juliana Preschool Program requires parent participation in the program approximately six times a year. Grandparents or other relatives may substitute for a parent.

Kindergarten through 8th Grade

Children entering Kindergarten must be 5 years old by September 1, 2005; those entering first grade must be 6 years old by September 1, 2005; etc. The regular school day is 8:15 am until 2:40 pm. We offer a full-day and a half-day kindergarten program. Half-day students may be in the same classroom as the full-day students or in a half-day classroom. The number of students enrolled in the half-day program for a given year determines whether there will be a half-day classroom that year. Usually this decision is made by the end of June. Family tuition rates are available for families with more than one child attending St. Juliana School. New tuition rates will be available upon completion of the 2005-2006 parish budget process.
