

"This is My chosen One, The Beloved"

Tony De Mello, S. J. tells this story in one of his books. You may have heard it quoted by me in one or another homily:

Teresa of Avila was journeying to one of her far-flung Carmelite monasteries. On the way there, the weather turned severe. It began to rain and the dusty road soon turned to mud and slush. Teresa was traveling in a covered cart pulled by a horse. As the car negotiated the edge of a raging stream, one of the wheels slipped causing cart and horse - yes, and Teresa! - to tumble down into the cold, muddy water. Spontaneously Teresa exclaimed: "Oh Lord, why do you let such things happen to me?!"

A voice boomed out from behind the thick, black clouds: "This is the way I always deal with my close friends, Teresa." Up to her waist in surging, chocolate-brown water, Teresa sputtered back in reply: "No wonder you have so few friends, Lord!!"

Yes, it does seem that the closer you get to God, the more liberties God takes with your life. Look at the life of Jesus, our Savior and Lord. As the life of Jesus gained in momentum, it seems that He was more and more misunderstood and opposed. The more He revealed Himself and God as being one - "the Father and I are One, if you must know!!" - the more humans thought they could eradicate Him and His message.

In the face of this opposition, what must have been the human feelings of Jesus? Did He, perhaps begin to have His own doubts, His own misgivings?

The mystery of the Transfiguration was as much for Jesus as it was for His followers. The life of Jesus was encapsulated in the Father's testimony. At His baptism God said to Him: "You are mine!" And now again at the brink of His Passion the Father reiterates the truth: "You are my chosen one, my beloved." It was as much to strengthen the wavering faith of His disciples as to strengthen His faith in the Father's love.

Many of our lives seem to move inexorably toward suffering. Old age itself is a time of surrender and weakness. Our crosses take different forms: illness, mental deficiencies, perhaps even betrayal by loved ones. It is for us that Jesus goes through His Passion with God's assurance that there is meaning in suffering. We live in a world which views suffering as undesirable and something to be avoided. But suppose sufferings and weakness were vehicles of salvation for ourselves and the world, which is so filled with them!? Nothing can separate us from the love of God revealed in Our Lord Jesus Christ. Not even death - seemingly the ultimate "suffering" - can overcome the power of God's love and will to save us.

To suffer is to be chosen for a special role in the history of salvation. In the last analysis, it is not ours to choose whether we will suffer or not. We can only choose to unite our inevitable sufferings to the Power of the Cross. This is not for the fainthearted. It is only for the truly **BRAVEHEARTS** who become aware that they are chosen by God to imitate Jesus - perhaps more literally than we care to think!


