Petitions are an essential part of every St. Joseph Table. You are encouraged to write your intentions in a petition book located at the table and offer your personal prayers to St. Joseph.

Small keepsake bags are given to all that visit the table. Each bag contains a blessed bun and a blessed fava bean. The bread represents the "Staff of Life". It is a belief that if you store the bun in your refrigerator, you will never go hungry. The fava bean originally grown for animal feed, thrived under the worst conditions. It was the sustaining food for starving farmers and their families. They were considered "lucky" to have fava beans to eat. Legend has it that the person that carries fava beans in their pocket will never be without coins.

Father Phil's Ramblings

Dialogue! Dialogue! Dialogue!

The three Gospel "stories" beginning with the Samaritan woman at the well and concluding with today's Gospel "story" of Lazarus are really more than just stories. They are dialogues. The definition of dialogue is: "a conversation between two or more people."

The conversation between the woman at Jacob's well and Jesus was a verbal give-and-take between them. The results? The woman became a disciple and Jesus, who is always thirsty for us, had his thirst satisfied with the woman's faith.

The conversation between the man born blind, the Pharisees and with Jesus, Himself, was somewhat different. The blind man spoke honestly but the Pharisees never listened. This was not a dialogue; the Pharisees were 'blinded' themselves and did not want to have a give-and-take conversation. When the blind man who could see spoke to Jesus, he too became a disciple because he wanted to find that person who cured him. He wanted to see and believe in Jesus.

And in today's dialogue, Jesus talks with Lazarus' sisters, Martha and Mary. Martha, especially, tells Jesus she is angry with Him because He wasn't there. Angry conversation is permissible and sometimes is good as long as one goes beyond the anger.

Jesus showed by his emotions and his tears, his human love and pain at the death of a good friend. Jesus was not afraid to communicate his feelings when He talked to Lazarus' sisters and to the Jewish leaders. Emotions and feelings are very important in carrying on an open conversation or dialogue.

Finally, when Jesus shouted for Lazarus to come out of the tomb, we really know a true dialogue; Lazarus came forth.

The message for all of us in these three dialogue stories of faith and love is we too must carry on an open and honest conversation with God -- that's prayer. The lessons in each of the dialogue stories definitely illustrate the difference between good and bad conversation. We must hold good, sincere and honest conversations with others -- our spouses -- our children -- our friends and neighbors.

Imagine if in all of our relationships, we had good conversations. What a wonderful family -- what a wonderful parish -- what a wonderful world this would be!

"Together For Life"

There on my desk in front of me is a little booklet we give to those who come for marriage preparation. It contains suggestions for the liturgy of marriage and helps the couple give their own distinctive touch to the celebrations. The booklet is entitled: **Together For Life.**

So here I am, sitting and waiting for the Spirit to give me inspiration for this week's column. And this booklet keeps staring up at me and the title starts to bounce around in my brain - Together For Life. Is this the message for this week?

Next to the title is a design, obviously intended to give visual expression to the title. Two candles, inserted, as it were, on either arm of a cross, the glow of their haloes intersecting with each other. And here I sit, not realizing that the Spirit is indeed working within me.

"Together for Life" is a beautiful expression of my relationship with God - of **our** relationship with God and each other. From the moment of our conception we have been destined to be just that, "together for life." From one point of view, there is something off-putting about this "together for life" business. Sounds a lot like some kind of sentence, an albatross - around-the-neck sort of thing. At its best, though, it is a wonderful expression of love and "being-there-for" someone, is it not? Paul said it in such an exquisitely direct way: "...there is nothing in all creation that will ever be able to separate us from the love of God which is ours through Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8, 39).

But as I allowed the Spirit to play with my mind and heart, it became clear that "together for life" has another meaning, equally profound, though more subtle to the grasp. **Together, For Life.** The comma is an attempt to express that other meaning. That is to say, if you really want to live, it must be "together." **LIFE** is a shared reality. In fact, there can be no individual life in a Mystery wherein God chooses to reveal Him/Herself as Trinity, Community, together for life.

So, if we want life, it will have to be a "together" reality. If then we take the "I" out of living and replace it with the "Oh!" of awe and wonder, it becomes loving. Cute, no? So there's a permanency about this whole Mystery which is expressed in that ordinary expression, "for life." And there's a result from this togetherness "for life."

O my God! How utterly confusing I have made this so wondrous of our life's experiences! I can only ask your pardon. But, alas, I can't guarantee that it won't happen again. Anyway, we're in this **TOGETHER, FOR LIFE.**

Be wary of small pamphlets!!

We have been sentenced to life by our God through Jesus Christ by the power of the Spirit!

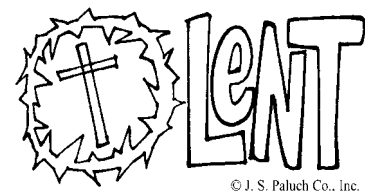

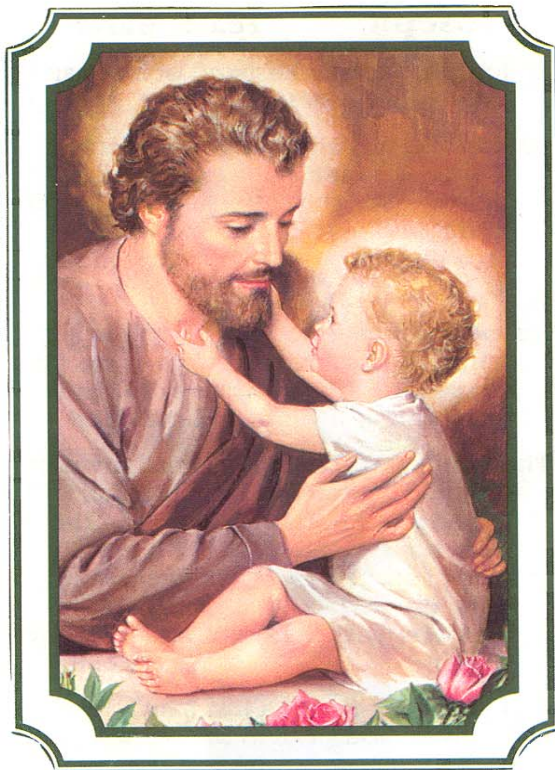

Thanks...You Are The Best!!!!

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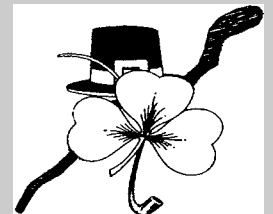

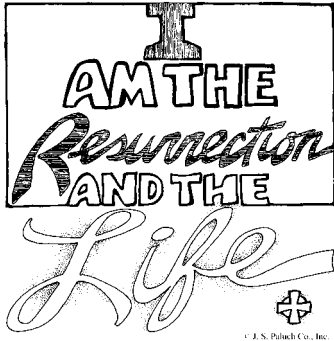

Operation Rice Bowl - St. Juliana Students Reach Out To Needy

At St. Juliana School one of the ways the students and teachers will honor the traditions of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving this Lent is to participate in Operation Rice Bowl, an Archdiocese of Chicago program supported by Catholic Relief Services to feed the hungry. The children chose to give up an activity or favorite food (fasting) and give the money it would have cost (almsgiving) to Operation Rice Bowl. Throughout the Lenten season the students and teachers will be including in their prayers the people that will be helped with their Operation Rice Bowl donations.

On Ash Wednesday, cardboard 'bowls' were sent home with the students along with an Operation Rice Bowl calendar that tells the stories of people around the world who are in need and the ways in which Operation Rice Bowl has helped them to help themselves. Each Monday during Lent the students hear stories about people who have been helped by Operation Rice Bowl.

Eighth grade teams discuss ways they have kept their Lenten Promises of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving and then visit homerooms in Grades 1 through 6 to encourage the younger students and to share their progress in their Lenten journey.

At the weekly Monday morning prayer service, a student from each homeroom comes to the office to put a scoop of rice in the school rice bowl as a symbol of the Lenten giving during the past week. This school rice bowl is displayed at the main entrance of the school.

On Holy Thursday, March 24th, the rice bowl will be blessed as a sign of the students' Lenten almsgiving.
