His greatest gifts to the Church and the world were his humanity and embrace of life, his witness of how to live as a follower of Jesus, and finally, how to die as a true believer.

May his life and death bring forth a renewal in the Church and may the world come to embrace all of life, and live lives of faith and love in the Resurrection.

May John Paul II's example lead all of us to a deeper understanding of how to live, and to welcome the hope of the Resurrection in our acceptance of our cross and suffering.

"Christ Had To Suffer And To Rise From The Dead"

We're familiar with the stereotype of the inquisitive youngster who keeps asking: "Why, Daddy/Mommy?" they sometimes try the patience of their parents by their desire to know the reasons behind events or the realities of life. In our post-Easter season when the Scriptures reiterate that "the Christ had to suffer and die and rise," we too, perhaps, are sorely tempted to know the reason "why."

The notion that Jesus "paid the price of our sins" does not satisfy. It implies some one, something more powerful than God. God ended up having to "buy us back" from some power which had gotten control of us. Even the word "redemption" seems to support such a view of things - to redeem is to "buy back."

As I'm writing this, my mind is groping for the answer which will give me "a new twist" to the mystery. After a line and two paragraphs, I realize that "mystery" is, perhaps, the apt word for what God has accomplished in Jesus - and the way He/She has accomplished it. There is no undoing of what has been done. It seems a little like someone who can't swim - or won't! — jumping into the water to save someone who definitely cannot swim. Why not remain God and do the whole thing by divine remote control?" Why do it by becoming like us and ending up a "loser?"

Jesus returns after His Resurrection and makes every effort to prove to His friends that He is the Person they related to before His death. He shows His wounds; He lets them touch Him; He eats a piece of baked fish and reminds them of the many times they ate together on the shore. And He reminds them of the many references He had made to the Scriptures and how they were being fulfilled in Him.

But while establishing that connection with them and Himself, Jesus reveals that the victory over sin and death is real. He has truly arrived!! But, as in His own lifetime, the totality of the mystery was hidden, being revealed only in signs and shadows, so His friends would have to follow Jesus, trusting and believing that their own lives would have a similar pattern — trusting and believing as Jesus Himself did.

After Jesus, our own lives, like the lives of His original friends and disciples, would be divine — human realities. In a strange way, the closer our lives would imitate the life of Christ, the more assured we would be that we travel the road He did. Pain, frustrations, moments of loneliness and discouragement, life's unintelligibles, all these would only highlight the joys and companionship, forgiveness and love which are the reality of being alive. In the end, only Life will remain. Jesus tells us all: "Because I live, you will also live!"

In a way known only to God, our lives have to be the way they are - check the Scriptures! Ah, but the spirit must open our minds and hearts!

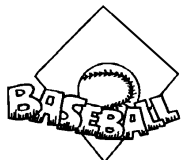
The St. Vincent de Paul bins have been moved to the alley next to the Parish Center.

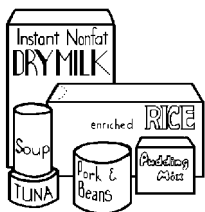

RECOGNIZING JESUS

St. Peter speaks to us twice today. In the first reading, we hear an excerpt from his sermon on Pentecost; in the second, part of his first letter. Once a frightened, uneducated fisherman who often said just the wrong thing, now Peter is speaking what he knows to be true. Everything Jesus had said now makes sense. His death and rising were all part of God's plan, and our faith and hope can be centered on God.

Today's Gospel tells the story of Jesus' walk to Emmaus with two of the disciples. Frightened, sad, and confused, the two men don't recognize Jesus, who tells them what we heard Peter say above: all this had to happen as part of God's plan. In the end, these disciples recognize Jesus as we are to recognize him--in the breaking of the bread.

Without them doing that, I might not be able to accomplish as many things. They really do care about each and every child and how well they do in school. I know that I am so lucky for being in such a loving school and parish. For all the things that they do for me, sometimes I feel I should give back to them.

Some of the most memorable times I remember are when I was volunteering at the nursing home. I always enjoyed walking into a room and having the person's face light up, because they were so happy to see someone new. I can't exactly explain that feeling, but I encourage more people to try and volunteer somewhere. When I helped work the Steak Fry, I was so happy because I finally got to give back to the parish that has given me so many opportunities and happiness. Altar serving, to me, is kind of fun; not only am I helping the priests and others at the Mass, I get to practice my faith and that's very important to me. I know that volunteering will help me in my future years during high school, college, and even when I'm an adult.

I have been at St. Juliana since kindergarten and I can't believe it's gone by this fast. I know that many people have helped me through my journey to eighth grade. I would like to thank my parents first, because I know it's not exactly easy to pay for my tuition. I want them to know, however, that I have learned priceless morals and memories that I'll never forget. I also want to thank the parishioners, because we truly are one big family. Everyone is so kind to one another, and I'm so grateful for that. They've also helped the school financially, and without them our school would not be the same. Of course I want to thank my teachers that I've had over the years. They have taught me so much about myself, and they're always there if I have a problem or question. I don't know what I would do without their help and encouragement. I want to give one more thank you to my friends, who've made me laugh and maybe sometimes cry. They've helped me through the worst times, and they've been there with me during the best. This school has meant everything to me for the past eight years. I would not have enjoyed it as much if any of you were not there.
