Father Phil's Ramblings

Priorities!

We have heard it said many times: Get your priorities straight. What *really* matters? Look at the big picture. Unfortunately, we often only see one part of the plan, so to speak.

Recently, during one of our weekly staff meetings, discussion took place about the relocation of our St. Vincent de Paul drop boxes and the recycling containers. After much debate, and for various valid reasons, the aforementioned collection bins were moved. The relocation has since become a tempest in a tea pot, and you may have noticed that the bins have been relocated again and again since then, largely due to complaints. Now why do we have used clothing bins and recycling boxes? Read on:

The St. Vincent de Paul boxes were moved to the alley north of the Parish Center and, with a few minor adjustments, are happy in their new home. I'm happy to report that **your donations are so plentiful they need to be picked up three times weekly!** Oh behalf of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, thank you for your efforts for the poor.

The recycling containers have been a bit more challenging. Let me first say I admit they are large and unsightly. I also acknowledge that we earn some much-needed supplemental income for our school in return for our participation in the recycling program. Beyond that, please allow me to share with you our thoughts on the importance of their presence on our grounds:

- For every ton of paper recycled, an average of 17 trees are saved. **Since November 2000, St. Juliana has saved almost 7,100 "trees"**. Yes -- more than seven thousand trees -- amazing!
- Each ton of recycled paper produced requires 4,102 kwh less energy than virgin paper. For comparison, the average US residence uses approximately 8,100 kwh to heat and air condition annually. **St. Juliana has collected more than 417 tons of paper, enough energy savings to heat and cool more than 210 homes for one year.**
- For every ton of recycled paper produced, 3 cubic yards of solid waste are kept out of landfills or incinerators. **We have saved more than 1,250 cubic yards of landfill space, enough to fill four classrooms from floor to ceiling.**
- Overall emissions of air pollution is reduced by 60 pounds

per ton of recycled paper produced; **we have reduced emissions pollution by more than 25,000 pounds.**

- We teach and practice good recycling habits in our school, and encourage students to continue their recycling efforts at home by including aluminum and plastic recyclables, as well as paper. It is important that we continue to practice what we preach.
- Local businesses and homeowners may not have the physical space available to store recycling containers of their own, and it is important that we contribute a small bit of our own space to this effort. Our recycling containers are almost filled to overflowing every week -- this affirms to me the importance of keeping them available to the neighborhood.

In summary, by keeping recyclables out of the trash, we reduce the cost of waste removal, decrease the rate at which our community landfills are filling, and clean up air, earth, and water by reducing the added pollution that results from refinement of virgin materials. Please join us in being good global citizens by disposing of your paper, newspaper and magazines in our recycling dumpsters. Recycling makes a difference and provides a brighter future for all!

I'm hopeful our priorities broaden and become more expansive. Yes, the bins may be ugly, but they certainly serve the needs of the less fortunate and as you can see, help preserve our environment. As we celebrate Earth Week (April 16 - 23), let us keep our priorities straight and not lose sight of the forest for the trees.

“They Do Not Recognize The Voice Of Strangers”...The other day I was standing with our wonderful crossing guard, Maureen Mannion. I often spend a bit of time with her after morning Mass or in the afternoon. She is so cheerful and caring with the children as she guides them across the street and controls the traffic for their safety.

Well, one day a youngster pulled up on his cycle and began waiting for the light to cross. A number of our St. Juliana students had already crossed and it was a joy to be greeted by them or simply smiled at. This youngster on the cycle stared straight ahead. I tried to engage him in conversation and greeted him. I thought maybe if I extended my hand for a hand shake, he would greet me. But he simply ignored me. That was pretty painful for me, really!

Maureen tried to assuage my hurt by saying that he didn't seem to be one of our students but perhaps he was from one of the other schools in the vicinity. Still, I wondered whether all the adverse publicity we priests have received of late hadn't created an atmosphere of suspicion, even fear, in some youngsters. But then I remembered how Mom and Dad had always taught my brother and me "not to talk to strangers." It's certainly the admonition of concerned parents and teachers.

In today's Good News, Jesus tells us: "Don't talk to strangers!" Well actually, the context was slightly different but the principle is the same. "...The sheep follow the shepherd because they recognize his voice. But they will not follow a stranger; they will run away from him, because they do not recognize the voice of strangers."

In India, I used to be intrigued with the way ordinary shepherds would keep their small flocks together while walking alongside a busy road. They had accustomed their sheep to a series of special sounds and movements of the staff which the sheep implicitly understood. Their sheep were trained to respond only to their shepherd's signals and no stranger could entice them away from the path determined by their shepherd - owner.

However, if someone really wanted to steal those sheep, I suppose he or she could observe the shepherd, listen to his special sounds, and learn to use the staff with similar movements. If nothing else, the sheep would be confused enough to follow the thieves, it being difficult for them to get a clear message. The thieves could succeed in misleading the flock. As Jesus Himself said: "A thief comes only to steal and slaughter and destroy: I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly."

There are some good "imitators" of Jesus in our world today. They wear different disguises, but some of them actually know some Jesus - signals. It's hard, sometimes, to tell the difference between them and the Good Shepherd. But I guess we have to apply another principle from the Good News: "By their fruits you shall know them!" Those fruits of the Good Shepherd's call and direction are:

**WISDOM...UNDERSTANDING...RIGHT JUDGMENT...COURAGE...
KNOWLEDGE...REVERENCE...AWE OF THE LORD.**

On May 5th, some of our youngsters will be confirmed in the Gifts of the Holy Spirit. Ultimately, I suppose all these gifts can be summarized: Don't talk to strangers!" Am I, perhaps, stretching it a bit!? I don't think so. You got the gifts; use 'em!

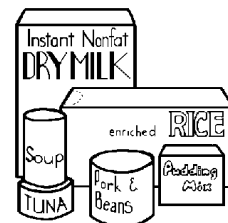
