## Father Phil's Ramblings

#### **Plenty Good Room**

"In my Father's house there are many dwelling places," said Jesus. There is an old spiritual that interprets this text in the unforgettable way characteristic of spirituals. It is called "Plenty Good Room": "Plenty good room! Plenty good room! / Plenty good room! / Plenty good room! / So choose your seat and sit down."

Jesus was preparing to leave this world. In today's Gospel he begins to tell his disciples goodbye. They are like little children who have just learned their parents are going out for the evening. "Where are you going?" "When are you coming back?" Who is going to stay with us?" Notice, the disciples do not ask what is going to happen to Jesus. They ask what is going to happen to them. We didn't invent self - centered religion! Jesus reassures the disciples that in the Father's house there are many rooms. Room for them. Plenty of good room.

What is Jesus saying about heaven in this passage? We all wonder about heaven, don't we? Yet we admit to not understanding much about heaven. Consider, however, that it wouldn't be heaven if we could understand it. Imagine being given the job of communicating to the human embryo in the mother's womb what life in this world is going to be like? Similarly, we don't have the capacity to understand God's eternal realm. On the other hand, Jesus does tell us a couple of very important things about heaven.

First Jesus says heaven is generous. There are many dwellings in the Father's house. "Plenty good room." That's good news, isn't it? Maybe there's room enough for us! Or is it bad news? What if there is also room for your enemies, the very people you know don't deserve to be there?

We try our best to keep God domesticated. We think of God as "our God." The God of the Bible, on the other hand, is the God of the universe. The testimony of the scriptures is that "in Christ God was reconciling the world into himself." It does not say God was reconciling us and our kind to himself! In the Father's house are many rooms. Earlier in John's Gospel, Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd; I know my own and my own know me... And I have other sheep, that are not of this fold; I must bring them also, and they will heed my voice. So there shall be one flock, one shepherd." Probably "other sheep" is a reference to the gentile world. This would have been an unthinkable idea to the Jewish leaders.

The point is: in God's heart there is room for more people than there is in our hearts. If this is true of heaven, then it needs to affect how we relate to all people on earth. Our own hearts must grow, not just in depth, but in breadth.

## They Were Confirmed in Their Faith

All of the sacraments are abiding presences of God in our lives. They are not "one-shot" deals, celebrated and experienced with great pomp on a particular day. The sacraments are "beginnings." Something begins to happen in our lives and then grows and develops until the day we die. Those of us who are, ahem, in our 60's and then some, know that life is a lot like a roller coaster. Just when you reach the top, you begin to go down. A little like being a 7th or 8th grader.

But, strange to say, the sacraments adjust themselves to all the periods of our lives. Or more correctly, God the Spirit adapts Him/Herself to us as we live through the various stages of our human lives.

As I may have pointed out in some previous reflection, it is more correct to use the continuous-present tense in referring to God's action in us. So it's not: "I have been baptized," or "I have been confirmed," but: "I am being baptized" and "I am being confirmed."

Confirmation is not some sort of "seal of approval" on our faith or knowledge of the catechism. Perhaps when we find ourselves most confused, most unsure of ourselves, most in need of direction, most doubtful about what our Faith is all about, that is precisely the time when we should seek "confirmation," support, the beginning of a fresh outpouring of the spirit of God.

Sometimes - not always, but sometimes - it's a little like: "I don't want to receive that sacrament because my faith in the sacrament is not strong enough yet. But it might be as true to say: "My faith in that sacrament is not strong enough because I need that sacrament dwelling within me for that faith to be strong enough!" What do they call that? A "Catch 22" situation!?

We are constantly "confirming" our children in their value as persons and our love for them. We also need that sort of confirmation in order to live healthy, productive human lives. When God wants to do the same for us, it is as if we shy away, professing insufficient knowledge and the necessity of taking time to "look into the matter."

The little children who come to communion in the arms of their parents and reach out their hands to receive the Lord "just like Mommy or Daddy", are beautiful examples of how the wonder and power of the sacramental system should be conveyed to our children. Through us adults, obviously, no? If the sacraments make Mom and Dad faith-filled, happy Christians, then the attraction for our youngsters will be evident. But if we have to tell our youngsters: "This is what this sacrament should mean to you; this is what this sacrament should do for you in your faith life — but the "talk is not walked..."

The sacraments are not "club membership initiation" rites, accomplished in one ceremony, no matter how long! They give witness to a Christian life begun and being lived continuously 24/7.

## St. Juliana Parish Blood Drive This Sunday, April 24th

Blood is needed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Imagine being told that, at long last, a donated organ suddenly has become available and the lifesaving transplant surgery you need is all set—but there's not enough blood available to start the procedure.

If you think this situation sounds far-fetched, you should know that it happened here in Chicago, recently. For several hours, the blood bank director at the University of Illinois Medical center at Chicago and his staff were scrambling to fill patient and surgeon needs. They needed to provide blood for two lifesaving transplant surgeries (one liver and one heart) in the face of an inadequate supply of type O blood. LifeSource rushed 15 recently collected units of blood to the hospital and surgeries were successfully completed.

More blood donors of all types are urgently needed. Youy donation can save the lives of up to 3 area patients.

Stop in the Ahearn Parish Activity Center this Sunday and donate blood - it won't take very long. Your donation could save a life.

Each week the second graders have studied scripture stories, learned about the Mass, the Eucharistic Celebration, and have done special projects with their families, in preparation for their First Communion.

For one project the child along with another family member made a cloud and a rainbow and wrote on the cloud "Our Gifts to God". On the rainbow family members wrote ways they will help each other.

The "First Communion Box" was another family project. After decorating an old shoebox and changing it into "My First Communion Memories" box they filled it with photographs, prayer cards, and other things that will always remind them of the day they first received Jesus.

As a final reminder of all the things that they had been learning, the children and their families made a "Sunday with Jesus" mobile. They drew and cut out symbols to help them remember Jesus' gift of Himself. All the students who are making their First Communion also create a personalized banner to commemorate this special day.
