

Incarnation to Incarnation

Wow! When the Church's liturgical "engines" get revved up, it's one major Mystery after another! Somewhere back there, we started to prepare for Christmas, the Epiphany, then Lent, then Holy Week and Easter, then the Ascension, then Pentecost, then Holy Trinity, and now the Feast of the Body and Blood of the Lord...pant, pant, pant. Whew! It's almost a relief to get into "ordinary time," no?

It took many years before I saw the beauty of these feasts and how they cover salvation history in such a powerful way. It's like a huge circle - maybe that's why we refer to the "liturgical cycle." Beginning with God breaking into our human history by being conceived in His Mothers' womb, we are taken, as it were, "up" into the Mystery of God by Jesus Christ. Jesus then returns to us by the power of the Holy Spirit and is "incarnated" in each of us and in us as a community, the Church.

The Mystery of God's fulfilling love begins with the Body and Blood of Jesus and comes to its realization in the Body and Blood of Jesus which we receive, into which we are being transformed. God "comes down into" our lives, and we are "taken up into" God's life. Jesus is incarnated and made alive in us by the Holy Spirit. We are incarnated and come alive in God by the Holy Spirit.

I wonder how long it took the Church to realize - I mean, really realize - the Mystery of the Body and Blood of Jesus made available to human history until the end of time. Even centuries into the church's life, there were people who attempted to turn the Mystery into a mere "symbol" of a reality beyond our understanding. I suppose there are people even today who would feel that the Eucharist is a "beautiful symbol" of the communion of all peoples. Why make rules about it? Why obfuscate the beauty of it all with the rigamarole of "canonical restrictions" and too much Church control?

Somehow the answer to that question lies in the original Mystery, the prototype, as it were. It was a scandal to the Jews and foolishness to the Greeks. "God becomes human!? Yeah, right!" As absurd as "Humans become like God!" we've been struggling with the literal meaning of: "**THIS IS MY BODY - THIS IS MY BLOOD**" since Jesus uttered those words about 2000 years ago. We would love to be able to put a definitive human understanding on the whole business and allow all people to partake of the Eucharist as a symbol of our universal table-fellowship. "My friend is not a Catholic, Father, but he'll be here for my wedding. Is it O.K. if he receives the 'bread' and 'wine'? He's a great guy."

The ultimate question is, of course: "What does your friend believe he will be receiving?"

The Body and Blood of Christ is a **DREAM**, yes. But it is a **REALITY** which makes it possible for us to dream of a day when we will be one, as Jesus and the Father are One, enveloped in Love, the Spirit.
