Father Phil's Ramblings

Over the last few weeks many parishioners, staff members and clergy friends have asked, "Who's the new pastor?" They were all a little shocked when I told them I truly did not - and still do not - know. The application/selection process has been taking place with the Priests' Personnel Board and they don't include the outgoing pastor in that process.

I do know that more than one priest has applied for the position, but I also know that there are other parishes seeking pastors and the "well is running dry," so to speak. Vocations to priesthood are very low and even though Cardinal George recently ordained 16 men to serve in our archdiocese, many of them are from other countries. So, we continue to wait and pray that the Board does their best in matching applicant to parish.

Another disturbing issue is the removal of priests from parishes due to allegations of sexual abuse. Just recently, the long-time pastor of Queen of Angels, Rev. Bill O'Brien, was removed pending investigation of allegations. Father O'Brien succeeded me as pastor at Queen of Angels ten years ago. The accusations of sexual abuse stem from Father O'Brien's term at St. Cajetan's and are horrible - as is any sort of abuse - if proven true.

With the lack of priestly vocations and with the scandal that is associated with priests, the well truly is running dry. And here I am, ready to retire. I assure you that even though I may be retired from the pastorate of St. Juliana, I will be serving the people of St. Juliana as a priest as long as the Good Lord allows.

In today's gospel message, Jesus calls his friends to be his disciples - his teachers - his priests. He said the harvest is plenty but the laborers are few. In other words, Jesus also proclaimed the well to be dry. So I guess we should take courage that in Jesus' time there was also a lack of vocations. I believe that the call to be a disciple - to serve and witness - is a call to men AND women; to the single AND married; to fisherman and to every kind of occupation.

I urge you to pray for our new pastor, whoever he may be; pray for both the victims and those accused of sexual abuse; pray for vocations to priesthood, whether they be men or women, whether single or married. Pray that the Holy Spirit who is with the Church challenges that Church - both leaders and Laity - to be disciples, because the harvest is great!

**“Do Not Go Into Pagan Territory
Or Enter A Samaritan Town.
Go Rather To The Lost Sheep Of The House of Israel.”**

I've always wondered about these instructions of Jesus to His followers as He sent them out alone for the first time. They seem to smack of an exclusivity uncommon to the personality of Jesus as we know Him from other parts of the Good News. “Wonder” is a “wonder-ful” thing, isn't it? It's the basis of any true knowledge and scientific development. It's also the basis for any personal growth in spirituality or self-knowledge.

When we were kids, we used to go to our Uncle Joe and Aunt Helen's small cottage located just outside of McHenry in Wonder Lake. And so it was - Wonder Lake! I may have written about this place before in some reflection or other. It was a place before of “wonders” for us city-kids. In those days - we're talking 55 years or so ago - the setting was rural and the lake was within walking distance from “the cottage,” as we reverently called it. It was so refreshing to be there, if only for a day. Life moved to a different rhythm when we were at Wonder Lake: adults seemed more relaxed and playful, we kids explored the lake and surrounding fields, the whole family - and there were many of us there on any given weekend - moved more slowly and conversation often took on a philosophical quality. People were able to wonder at Wonder Lake.

You have to “shift gears” in order to wonder effectively. You have to go to your own personal Wonder Lake to play with the limits of your experience, whether that experience involves your personal spirituality or scientific curiosity. You also have to **PRAY** with the limits of your experience and often go beyond them into “Wonder Lake.”

So I wondered why Jesus would be so exclusive in His directives to His followers. It occurred to me that Jesus might well have been saying: “Don't go to the pagans and Samaritans just yet, because you're not ready for that. You're not so strong in your personal faith yet. You have not recognized the power of your own religious tradition.” Perhaps Jesus realized that if His followers went to pagan territories and among the Samaritans, they would have been tempted to condemn or judge those people in the light of the powers Jesus had given them.

We know how easy it is to play “one-up-man-ship” with people. The missionary history of the Church has abundant examples of people of good will and faith who moved into cultures and religious traditions they were unfamiliar with, and could not recognize that God had preceded them there. The Second Vatican Council tried to tell Catholic-Christians what Jesus told His early disciples: people of good faith in their own religious traditions are saved.

“The Truth is yet abuilding,” as we might say. The directive Jesus gave His followers 2000 years ago is as valid for us today as it was for the early disciples: Check out your own tradition; try to understand the beauty and potential present in other spiritualities and how, in their own way, they complete our experience of God.

Betake yourself to Wonder Lake—the Wonder Lake of God's own Spirit. And then go to the “pagan territories and Samaritan towns” to discover there what you have already discovered here - **THE WONDERFUL WORKS OF GOD.**
