Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time February 26, 2006

Merciful and gracious is the LORD, slow to anger and abounding in kindness.

— Psalm 103:8

In today's first reading from the Prophet Hosea the Lord speaks to His people:

> I will espouse you to me forever: I will espouse you in right and in justice, in love and in mercy; I will espouse you in fidelity, And you shall know the Lord."

God, the incurable romantic who "marries" His people!

As we stand at the threshold of Lent, it is good to be reminded that God "invented" romance - or rather, created it! We know what it means to be moved by passion and the deepest of human emotions. Such feelings are even thought of as concessions to human weakness, rather than human nature at its most powerful.

On Wednesday, the passionate romance of God with us begins - Lent. It would be a terrible mistake to think of it, or live it out, as a time of "going against oneself," of paying the price of our sinfulness. Ah, yes, it is that, but if it is not a time of passion and recommitment a renewal of marriage vows with the Lord, as it were - then it will be a time of heaviness and guilt.

Paul writes to the Corinthians: "Brothers and sisters: Do we need, as some do, letters of recommendation to you or from you? You are our letter, written on our hearts, known and read by all, shown to be a letter of Christ ministered by us, written not in ink but by the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets that are hearts of flesh."

Even the hard-nosed Paul is not above passionate references to his feeling for his communities because they are bound to him by LOVE.

Lent - the time of renewed honeymoon with God Who has chosen us from the beginning of time - "renewed" on our part, not God's. For in God there is no "renewal"; there is only Love with not beginning and no end!

" Love bade me welcome: yet my soul drew back Guilty of dust and sin. But quick-eyed Love, observing me grow slack

From my first entrance in, Drew nearer to me, sweetly questioning If I lacked anything.

'A guest,' I answered, 'worthy to be here.'

Love said, 'You shall be he.' 'I, the unkind, ungrateful? Ah, my

I cannot look on Thee.' Love took my hand, and smiling, did reply.

'Who made the eyes but I?' 'Truth, Lord, but I have marred them: let my shame Go where it doth deserve.'

'And know you not,' says Love, 'who bore the blame?'

'My dear, then I will serve.' 'You must sit down,' says Love, 'and taste my meat.' So I did sit and eat."

The mystic-poet George Herbert (1593-1633) has captured the Spirit of Lent so well, has he not?




TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Lent, the Church's annual prebaptismal retreat, prepares us to gather around the Easter font, renew our baptismal vows, and receive new life from the water as the elect are plunged into Christ's death and resurrection. This core meaning is more or less available, depending on whether we journey with catechumens in the parish and on the vigor of our liturgical celebration of the Triduum. Some persist in seeing Lent as a lonely journey in the wilderness: yet this week we enter the Lenten fast in solidarity with one another. The smudged foreheads you will spy throughout Ash Wednesday on buses, street corners, and supermarket aisles remind you that you are hardly alone in your desire to enact a spring cleaning regime for your spiritual life.

Long ago, this kind of repentance was available to Christians only once. Ashes and sackcloth were not raiment for a day, but permanent habits for public sinners. Fasting became a way of life, and if they sinned severely again, there was no hope of restored communion. Happily, this system did not endure. It produced reluctant Christians who even held back from baptism, like St. Augustine did, out of fear. Today we have recovered an ancient tradition that conversion and repentance are constant themes on life's journey, and that Lent is an annual opportunity to revive our baptismal identity, both as individuals and communities.



2. Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age, but not yet 59. Those who are bound to this may take only one full meal. Eating solid foods between meals is not permitted. But if necessary, two smaller meals are permitted in order maintain strength according to individual needs.

According to legend, the St. Joseph Table originated in Sicily several centuries ago, during a period of severe drought and famine. The people were starving and all they could grow were fava beans. In desperation, they prayed to St. Joseph, the protector of the Holy Family. He answered their prayers by sending good rains and an abundant harvest to end the famine. To thank and honor St. Joseph, the people built al-

tars consisting of grains, fruits, vegetables, seafood and wine. The food was served to the poorest of the poor and was shared in prayer and festivity. The practice continues today. As the Italian people migrated to the New World, they brought with them this unique and beautiful tradition that is carried on in homes and churches throughout the United States today.

Take a Walk With God

A Quick Introduction to a Labyrinth

What is a labyrinth?

It is a path for prayer that leads from yearning towards joy, meaning, hope, and peace. What is planted here flowers in the gardens of our lives. Whether perplexed, overjoyed, confused, hopeful, hurt, distraught, happy, or simply curious, as we pray, God meets us here. It is not unusual to emerge from the labyrinth walk inspired, encouraged, grateful, and clearer about next steps in our lives.



Church leaders have made use of labyrinth images in different ways. Using the metaphor of a labyrinth to illustrate important Christian beliefs can be traced as far back as the fourth century when several early church fathers, including Ambrose, Gregory of Nyysa, and Jerome, wrote about labyrinths. In the ninth century, monks working in monastery scriptoriums used labyrinth images to illustrate their manuscripts, many of which related to the seasons and passage of time. Familiarity with the images resulted in many churches, especially those in France, to install large scale labyrinths on their church floors during the twelfth and thirteenth centuries. Using a labyrinth involves moving your body through the path, and opening your heart in faith. A "typical" labyrinth experience involves preparing yourself at the threshold, following the single path to the center, spending time in the center, following the same pathway from the center out, crossing the threshold, and then responding to the experience. There is no single "right" way on walking the labyrinth: praying in whatever way helps you connect with God during the labyrinth encounter is the "right" way.


