“Take Your Sons, Your Only Sons, and Offer Them To Me”

As the 19th of March comes around, I am always reminded that my Mom and Dad heard something like what Abraham heard in today's first reading. That reading is all the more poignant for me since my brother Phil and I were ordained on March 19th, 1972, at St. Thomas the Apostle Parish on Chicago's near south side.

It was a fortuitous occasion from many points of view. My elder brother Phil, while younger in the Society of Jesus, was able to catch up with me in our course of Jesuit studies. He had completed law studies before entering the Society.

Before either he or I realized it, it was time for our ordinations to the priesthood. After seven years in India, I was allowed to come home for the event - I had gone to India in 1965 with the belief that I would never return home, since in those days we did not have the custom of home visits! My parents' joy was unbounded, as was ours.

Bishop Alfred Abramowicz graciously agreed to ordain us. He was a man of great sensitivity and charm. St. Joseph was a particular favorite of mine. So there were Graces bouncing all over the place at that time. It was a special gift from God for my parents; they had probably never dreamed, or dared to dream, that we would all be together for this wonderful occasion.

Whenever I hear the story of Abraham and his son Isaac, Mom and Dad come spontaneously to mind. We all know what the heart of Abraham must have felt, at this seemingly ruthless command of God: “Give me your only son! Obviously, Isaac is a symbol for all that each one of us holds dear, our hope for the future, our “staff “ in old age. We all have various types of “Isaacs” in our lives which seem to be the ultimate fulfillment of our aspirations and dreams. At times, and particularly during the Lenten season, God comes to us and perhaps asks us to give Him/Her what is most precious to ourselves. It could be a person, an attitude, a habit of behavior, feelings of depression, anger against someone. In some ways these things or people have become central to our lives. And God simply says: “Give this to me.”

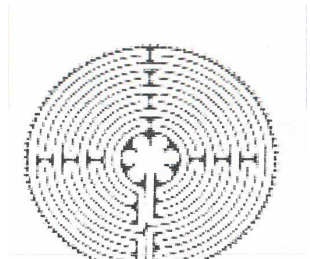
But God is not a tyrant, an overlord. God does not ask from us what He is not willing to give us. “Here, this is my beloved Son; take and receive Him! He is the most precious thing I have as God - my very life.” It is again that “admirable exchange” which the Fathers of the Church speak of. It is as if God says to us: “I'll show you what I mean by ‘precious,’ by ‘beloved.’ Then you match my gift by one of equal value; something which is your life itself.” The problem is that when we go inside ourselves, we may find some very crass things we consider “precious” in our lives: wealth, human respect, prejudice, defense mechanisms of various shapes and sizes. Maybe our true selves, the “beloved son-daughter” aspects of who we are, is covered over with a daily grime which collects just from living in the world.

The Lenten season has come again, giving us an opportunity to see the real “Isaac” in who we are; giving us an opportunity to see the Jesus in who God is.

Labyrinth - Christian Theological Touchtones

When used from a faith perspective, labyrinths are spiritual tools that help people to perceive and connect with God's presence. The following questions can help you and other Christians experience labyrinths as valuable tools for relating to God.

What biblical verses and concepts support a Christian understanding of labyrinths.

- Labyrinths are spiritual tools that facilitate the various types of prayer illustrated in the Hebrew and Christian Scriptures, including, but not limited to, intercession, praise, meditation, confession, and free-flowing conversation with God.
- Concepts of journeying in faith and following God's path help link biblical teaching and the labyrinth experience.
- Those using labyrinths often report experiences of Christ's inviting, enlightening, and grace-full presence. Biblical themes of love, joy, peace, truth, comfort, guidance, service and wisdom are particularly relevant to these encounters.

What are some of the Christian theological messages of labyrinths?

- Divine help is available. A path of wisdom leads one to-

wards God.

- Religious devotion can be a pleasant experience.
- Truth and God's presence are linked. As one moves in the Divine Presence, truth becomes clearer and more compelling.
- Moving one's body in faith can support one's desire for spiritual connection.
- Journeying towards intimacy with God is seldom a linear process.
- Sacred patterns can assist seekers in moving beyond their own limitations. God speaks through visual symbols.
- Desire for wider service springs naturally from time spent with God.

What can be learned about God by using labyrinths?

- God values truth and communicates it freely.
- God's presence supports wholeness.
- God is unpredictable, but trustworthy. We cannot control or even anticipate God's next move in our lives.
- God is real and accessible.

The labyrinth is a safe space, come walk the prayer path and reconnect with God.

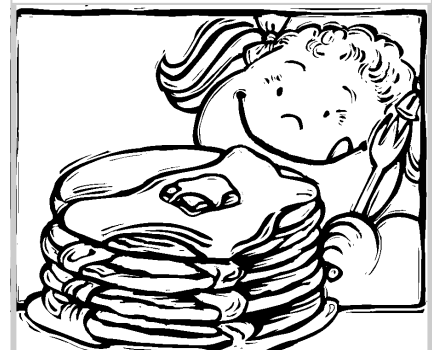

Petitions for St. Joseph Altar...

Petitions are an essential part of every St. Joseph Table. You are encouraged to write your intentions in a petition book located at the table and offer your personal prayers to St. Joseph.

Small keepsake bags are given to all that visit the table. Each bag contains a blessed bun and a blessed fava bean. The bread represents the "Staff of Life". It is a belief that if you store the bun in your refrigerator, you will never go hungry. The fava bean originally grown for animal feed, thrived under the worst conditions. It was the sustaining food for starving farmers and their families. They were considered "lucky" to have fava beans to eat. Legend has it that the person that carries fava beans in their pocket



St. Joseph Table

The St. Joseph Table

According to legend, the St. Joseph Table originated in Sicily several centuries ago, during a period of severe drought and famine. The people were starving and all they could grow were fava beans. In desperation, they prayed to St. Joseph, the protector of the Holy Family. He answered their prayers by sending good rains and an abundant harvest to end the famine. To thank and honor St. Joseph, the people built altars consisting of grains, fruits, vegetables, seafood and wine. The food was served to the poorest of the poor and was shared in prayer and festivity. The practice continues today. As the Italian people migrated to the New World, they brought with them this unique and beautiful tradition that is carried on in homes and churches throughout the United States today.

Our annual St. Joseph Table will be held on Sunday, March 19th from 1:00 pm until 4:00 pm. Last year our table fed close to 800 people and all surplus food was taken to soup kitchens delivered by our St. Vincent de Paul Society. Monetary donations were distributed to the needy of the parish.

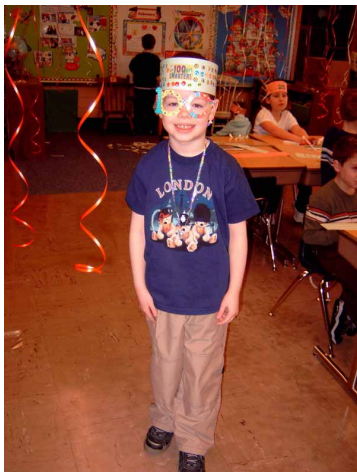


St. Juliana Students Celebrate 100th Day of School!
