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“There Was No Needy Person Among Them”

It seems like one of the first recorded experiences of a “mass conversion of heart,” no? In India the concept has negative connotations for people, since it implies that the “converted” people have been, in some way, enticed. But, from another point of view, would not any “conversion” imply some form of “enticement?” I mean, people are led to make a decision - in many cases, a life-altering one to attain to something better. Long ago, philosophers realized that people only move from here to there when they are led by something good. That includes something they may in a warped way think is good for them.

But a conversion of heart, the result of which would leave “not a needy person among them!?” No mass-suicide here. No turning over of one’s possessions to some central person or agency. No turning away from society or its needs.

It is not my purpose to argue the relative merits of the free-enterprise system vis a vis communism as it has developed historically. I would rather spend some time reflecting on the “no needy person” aspect of the conversion that took place after the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. We know that “needs” are of various types: economical, social, psychological, spiritual, etc. to say that there was no needy person in that particular community is saying something dramatic - something very, very powerful indeed.

Clearly, for the authors of the Acts of the Apostles, the fact that there was not a needy person in the community was, in some way, the proof par excellence that Jesus had indeed come to life again among His followers. The very first thing the community did to preach to Risen Lord was to see that there would be no needy person among them.

Sometimes in parishes there is concern expressed about the numerical size of the worshipping community. Some feel that, if a community is large, that this is a sign that it is healthy, thriving. In the earliest Church, we have a record that their primary concern was not about how they could extend themselves, but about seeing that there would be “no needy person” in their midst. Those early days after the Resurrection of Jesus must have been days of spiritual chaos, as the community looked at itself and, perhaps for the first time, the needs of all, with the eyes of the Spirit of Jesus.

There must have been reconciliations long overdue. The wealthy began to discern how much they really did need to live on. People with slaves began to wonder how best to express the common bond of faith and love they experienced with those whom, days before, they had considered “their slaves/servants.” The Apostles themselves, alive with the Spirit of the Lord, must have wondered how best to organize these outpourings of love and mutual concern, which other communities in the vicinity began to marvel at or even fear!

Perhaps some believers even said: “There must be no needy person among us!” Oh, days of love and new life! May they be ours here at St. Juliana.

Question: Are you a “Needy person? Aren’t we all?!”

Recently a document entitled *The Gospel of Judas* was published in an English translation for the first time. This might be a good time to go over the way the Scriptures, specifically the New Testament, was formed. Many Catholics are surprised to learn that the Canon was not officially set until the Council of Trent in the 1500's, although a common agreement on the composition of the NT was in the magisterial from the middle of the fourth century. (This is the latest date considered: by this date only a few communities were still trying to decide on a few documents that had already been accepted or rejected by the vast majority of the local churches.) So the question becomes, "How was that common agreement arrived at?"

During the first two or three centuries of the Christian Era, various documents were created and circulated within the Christian community: only a few of these came to be considered as part of the official literature, the Scripture, of the Church. This recognition was based on several factors.

First there was the question of antiquity. By the end of the second century the church realized that newly created gospels, letters, and revelations could not contain authoritative material about the salvific actions of Christ. The document also had to claim apostolic authorship: this was limited to the listed Twelve plus Paul. Material attributed to other early Christians, e.g. Mary Magdalene or Barnabas, were therefore excluded. (This is a complex matter. Today, most scripture scholars agree that several of the Pauline Epistles were not written by Paul, and many think that the canonical Gospels were not directly authored by the writers to whom they are traditionally ascribed - Mark and Luke carried the apostolic authority of Peter and Paul.)

Then there was openness, or transparency in today's language. If the document claimed to contain "secret sayings," or a "hidden revelation," it was rejected. The authentic Gospel was meant for everyone, and the early Church recognized this truth. Nothing was hidden: everything was open. (This is where the Gospel of Thomas, and the Gospel of Judas fail to make the grade.)

Finally there was general acceptance. The document in question was copied and circulated from one community to another. If this was not done, the document fell out of consideration. All of the churches had to accept, copy, and transmit the document. When everything had to be copied by hand this was an important consideration. If a local community didn't think that a document was worth copying, it just disappeared - it was lost, no one cared: it was neither authentic or important. Often this happened because of fantastic material or because it contained stories or teachings at variance with the community already held as authentic tradition.

Many documents couldn't pass muster. Those that did became our New Testament.

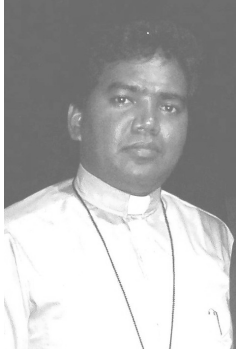
Richie Gomulka's latest CD is on sale for \$15.00 and available in the parish office or with Father Bob.

Reach Out To The Missions Of Bangladesh



I am Fr. Leonard S. Rozario CSC, a Holy Cross priest from Bangladesh. I have been living at Notre Dame High School, Niles, IL 60714, for the last three years with other Holy Cross priests and graduating from Northeastern Illinois University in MA-TESL (Masters in Teaching English as a Second Language). I will be graduating in May, 2006. I guess, all of you know that I have been involved at St. Juliana and helping out on weekends and other sacramental ministries since

September, 2005.

After my graduation I am expected to go back to Bangladesh to teach English as a second language to our unfortunate and underprivileged students there. Besides teaching, I am expected to build an English Language Lab to help our weak, poor, underprivileged, and tribal students and to help our village teachers how to teach English as a second language.

Before coming to the USA, I was a pastor of a parish called Corpus Christi Church, P.O. Jalchatra, Dist. Tangail 1996, Bangladesh. It is a tribal parish (Garo tribe). There are 8000 Catholics living in 29 villages. There are 22 elementary (Primary) schools, 2 Middle schools, 1 High school and 2 hostels for high school boys and girls having 250 students of this parish. There are 45 catechists – teachers are teaching and nurturing these small schools scattered in the villages. In fact, I will be involved to train and teach these teachers how to teach English as a second language on my return on July 4, 2006.

Before I go back to Bangladesh I wanted to reach out to your generosity to help our poor students of Bangladesh, especially for the poor tribal students of Corpus Christi Parish in their studies. Fr. Steve and his staff have been kind enough to provide me this opportunity to knock at your door. And I thought since I have been coming to help at St. Juliana, why don't I make a special request to help our poor, unfortunate, and tribal students of this parish. To be honest with you, my successor, Fr. Boniface Tolentino CSC, had sent out a request with some pictures of the poorest of the poor high school students who are unable to pay for their monthly boarding expenses (only \$10) and another \$10 for tuition. Can you imagine that we can give a month long education for a student with only \$20!!! I believe, your one dollar bill will not only give them education, and change their lives, but also will provide them hope to survive in the future.

I have another request to make. Since I will be involved to train our village teachers how to teach English as a second language, and will have to travel a lot from village to village organizing training programs for these teachers, for that I need a motor cycle to reach out to them. I really don't know how to approach you all or to the people of St. Juliana, but your prayers and support enabled me to make this special request to you to help our poor tribal students. I am always grateful for your prayer and support. Thanks for your kind listening.
