### “What Do You Have To Say For Yourself?”

The priests, Levites and Pharisees approached John the Baptist and tried to label him so they could “get a handle on him,” as we say. They tried to fit him into a category they could understand: the Christ, Elijah, the Prophet. I suppose they felt it would be easier dealing with John if they could “bracket” him somehow.

Labels help us see what we’re buying. They tell us the company who produced the product; they tell us the ingredients in the product or wearing apparel; they warn us about buying something whose seal has been broken; they give us dates to tell us how old a product is. Yes, labels are good in certain circumstances.

But when it comes to humans, be they Messiahs or ordinary folk, labels can be downright false or even dangerous. Identifying certain ethnic groups as having distinctive characteristics - one might say “caricaturistics” - can perpetuate prejudice and ill will. At the least, they can make certain people the butt of tasteless jokes or innuendos.

The sound of a person’s speech or the complexion of their face can easily lead to generalizations about the person’s origins or the neighborhood in which they live. And these, in turn, can evoke warmth or cold in our hearts, spontaneous friendliness, or even dislike. An “-ski,” or “O’B-,” or “-baum,” or “-dez,” or “-gyen,” or “-itz” can create a feeling of warm familiarity or, at its worst, animosity.

Color can have the same effect, no?

The Jewish priests, Levites, and Pharisees had stereotypical

images of the way some people acted, whether they were Samaritans, Romans, tax collectors, fisher-folk, or from Galilee! Their own reaction to such people was, unfortunately, as stereotypical as was the image they had of them.

I grew up with a lot of these stereotypes. I was also the “victim” of them. Well, so what else is new, you might ask?! Jesus came to make all things and people NEW! How sad that while we make scientific, medical, genetic progress, we are still so primitive in our human reactions to each other. Of course, certain stereotypes are healthy for society. E.G. as far as I know, a red traffic light signifies STOP-DANGER in all the cultures I am familiar with.

But people need to be met and talked to and eaten with and laughed with and cried with and danced with and sat in silence with. They need to be asked: “What do you have to say for yourself?” And they need to be listened to when they begin to answer that query. It might not be verbalized in a language you understand, but it might be communicated in the eyes or the posture of the body or in a smile or in a dance or a song or the way a person is dressed (camel’s hair??!) or by eating together or crying and laughing together or in just sitting together on a bus or El.

“Who did you say you were again?!”

Ray Charles sang it well: “You think you know me well. Well, you don’t know me.”

John the Baptist announces to the people that they have seen the Messiah but they do not recognize him. We hear this in today's Gospel.

To help us in this work of the Lord, Paul advises us to be joyful, to pray, and to give thanks to God for what he has given us (1 Thessalonians 5:16-24). In faith, during Advent and throughout the entire year, we recognize Jesus in others — and we offer our care, kindness, and welcome.

What goodness can we offer to the presence of Jesus in others?

## Christmas and New Year Mass Schedule

### Treasures From Our Tradition

Last week, we looked at a form of nativity scene called a *presipio*, characterized by framing the crèche of Jesus with a vast array of personalities and a rich geographical context. The tradition was carried to the New World, and finds very rich expression in Latin America today. While in Europe the *presipio* was reserved mostly to the homes of wealthy nobles and great churches, in Latin America it was claimed by the poor and expressed the skills of native artisans. In Mexico, you can still find clay figures in every village market. In a way, the native people took the religion of Spanish rule and baptized it with their Indian culture by surrounding the crib of Jesus with local geography and people. In Brazil, where Christmas falls in summer, the figure of the baby Jesus is wrapped in gold and gems, and set on a hillside surrounded by flowers and animals of all kinds. Sometimes there is a double *presipio*, presenting both Nativity and Crucifixion.

In some places in Latin America, even non-religious people take care to have a *presipio* in the home, sometimes dedicating one whole room in the house or apartment to the scene. Some cities have markets where people from the countryside sell plants and figurines. In Cuzco, churches and families provide hot chocolate for the children of the poor who come down to help create the nativity scenes. In Paraguay, the baby Jesus grows—the small infant who arrives on Christmas Eve is replaced at new year with a toddler Jesus who holds in one hand the globe and in the other a cross. Few Christmas traditions have the vitality and variety of *presipios* and crèches honoring the Nativity.

### Christmas Sharing Program - 2008

On December 6th & 7th, those of you who participated in our Christmas Sharing Program this year brought your gifts to the Ahearn Activity Center, which was a bustling place with our monthly "Coffee, Tea & Thee". Again, we were overwhelmed with all the gifts, food, certificates and cash that was donated.

On Sunday, December 7th we delivered to two different locations.

First, we traveled to Roseland (113th & Michigan) to deliver the baby gifts and some of the food to the Roseland-Altgeld Adolescent Parent Program. This program is a Catholic Charities program for teenage parents. There are about 275 participants. The gifts were distributed the next week at their annual Christmas party. Those who coordinate the program have been there for many years and it is always wonderful to see them each Christmas season. They were very grateful for the gifts, food, gift cards and money.

Next we traveled to Harvey (153rd & Ashland) to Ascension-St. Susanna Parish, which is one of our Sharing Parishes. Fr. Joe Altman, a former associate at our parish, was there to greet us. We brought them gifts for the children in their PYD (Positive Youth Development) Program and some of the food, gift cards and money. The gifts were distributed at their annual Christmas celebration the week before Christmas. They, too were very pleased with all they received.

On Wednesday, December 10th, the gifts for the men and women were picked up by 2 men who work with the Catholic Charities Shelter Program. Men and women are usually there 2-3 months until they can get back on their feet. The people were very grateful and said the gifts would be distributed at their Christmas party.

Our number of gifts, food, etc. were quite a bit more than last year. We collected approximately:

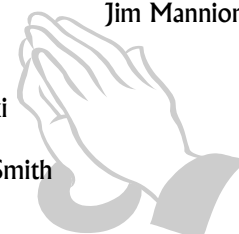
