“She Was Greatly Troubled At What Was Said and Pondered...” “How Can This Be, Since I Have No Relations With A Man...” “And Mary Said ‘Yes!’...”

After Mother Teresa's death, it came to light that she had suffered from very deep spiritual depression for many years. In the light of her international image as a saintly woman, whose life was dedicated to the Lord and the service of God's poor and abandoned, the discovery that for years she lived in a spiritual desert, bereft of consolation and the sense that what she was doing was pleasing to God was a shock. Plagued by doubts and insecurity of a most profound nature, she continued her search for God's will clinging to the charisma that had, over time, become known throughout the world.

When I met her, she exuded a confidence and leadership which belied her personal, interior struggles with faith and self doubt. She always seemed to exhibit a kind of leadership and relationship with government officials and Church authorities which seemed to indicate that she always knew where she was going, and where she was taking her Missionaries of Charity. But apparently, Mother Teresa, like any Mother, experienced long periods of dryness in prayer, and self doubt.

Is she less the Saint because of this, or more?

In today's Good News, we find that Mary also had her questionings and hesitations in the face of Gabriel's greeting. Mary did not say: "Oh, so you've finally turned up, eh? Well, let's get on with it!" Instead: "...She was greatly troubled at what

was said and pondered what sort of greeting this might be."

"Greatly troubled" means just that: "Greatly troubled." We can easily understand someone being greatly troubled, no? What seems to have been the troubling announcement was: "The Lord is with you!" Someone might say: "So what's the big deal? We say that at Mass many times - it's consoling, it's beautiful. Maybe we SHOULD be greatly troubled just as Mary was, when we hear those words. In the Eucharist, the minister says: "The Body of Christ"; and we say "Amen." For some of us that might be the equivalent of "O.K." or "Yeah, so what?"

We don't like being troubled. We'd like a Faith that has a clear, black and white message; not one that upsets us or troubles us.

"How can this be, since I have no relations with a man?" Mary is no innocent pre-pubescent. She knows the score and, angel or no angel, she's aware that the announcement that she will bear a son, the Son of God no less, just doesn't fit into the real scheme of her present experience of life. Again, she ponders and is troubled.

Questions unanswered, doubts unassuaged, Mary, troubled as she is, says: "Let whatever it is you're talking about be done unto me. I am the Lord's."

Mary did not have it any easier than we do when God breaks into our lives with the difficult or the seeming impossible.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Christmas is remembered and celebrated in many ways. As a child, it's the surprise and the gifts that mark the day. As a young person, it's the planning that goes into each gift as, for the first time, you can spend your own money to buy gifts for others. As a parent, it's the delight and happiness of children that leave the strongest impression. As an older adult, it's often the unity of the family that brings the most satisfaction. All of these are good, but each is only a part of something bigger. The more basic question is: what does Christmas mean to God?

St. Paul's letter to the Hebrews tells us that "in times past, God spoke in partial and various ways to our ancestors through the prophets; in these last days, he has spoken to us through the Son, whom he made heir of all things, who is the refulgence of his glory, the very imprint of his being." At the beginning of the Gospel according to St. John, we hear that God's eternal word took flesh and became light for the world, so that all could come to comprehend who God is and what is our destiny in God's plan.

Christmas, therefore, means we are to fit the bits and pieces of our lives and our experiences—the surprises, the generosity, the happiness, the unity—and the sin as well—to take all these and fit them into God's plan for us, revealed in Jesus of Nazareth, Son of God and son of Mary.

As disciples of Jesus Christ, we live by his light in the midst of the darkness of our own sins and the sins of the world. The world doesn't like to be exposed, as either partial or sinful, and resists the light now as when Jesus was born. But nothing the world can offer is eternal, nothing lasts forever, except the Word of God made flesh in the womb of the Virgin Mary. Today, Christmas celebrations will be more modest in many homes and memories will be different from other years. But what is done in and with and through Christ, the eternal Word of God, will be done well and will last forever.

I hope that some time in the future, we will recall that this was the Christmas we came to understand how God is always with us, in good times and in bad, in darkness and in light, so long as we remain one in him. This will then have been a truly blessed Christmas.

You and your intentions will be remembered in my Christmas Masses and prayers; please keep me and the needs of the Archdiocese of Chicago in yours.

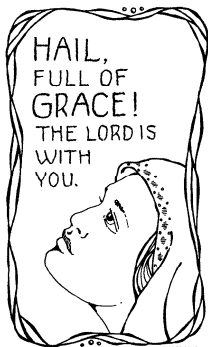
"A Season of Hope"

Treasures From Our Tradition

Children of the parish are somewhat focused on Santa Claus these days, who is keeping an eye on who's naughty and nice. Santa Claus, with his heavenly patron Saint Nicholas, has been more or less in charge of gift-giving to American children for a hundred years or so. In other places, perhaps more attentive to our Christian tradition, there are different gift-bearers. In Greece, Saint Basil delivers the presents on his feast day, December 31, and makes sure everyone is sprinkled with holy water. The Baby Jesus is in charge elsewhere, called the *Christkind* in Austria and Belgium, *El Niño Jesús* in Columbia, and *Le Petit Jesus* in France, where he shares his duties with *Père Noël*. In the Czech Republic almost everyone is atheist, but *Je íšek*, the infant Jesus, brings gifts to one and all. In Poland the "Star Man" is said to bring the gifts, although often he turns out to be the village priest in disguise. Saint Nicholas, not his Americanized cousin, is the giver in Holland, where he wears a bishop's miter, and in Russia, where he wears a bishop's crown. Soviet Russia tried to dethrone Saint Nicholas and promote Grandfather Frost, but no one was much fooled by this attempt to squeeze religion out of Christ's birth. One country has a saintly woman in charge of the gifts, Saint Lucy, honored in Sweden on December 13, when children serve their parents breakfast in bed, and others awake to news that they have been nominated for a Nobel Prize. Some children have a second round of gifts on Epiphany, when the magi assume the gift-giving duties. In general, the gifts of Christmas are simple pleasures, not great heaps of treasures. Once upon a time, a new pair of socks or an orange was enough for us. No matter what gifts we receive, all of them are to point us to the true gift, and the true giver.

I will be taking the 8th graders to deliver the packages to the residents of Forest Villa on December 17th.

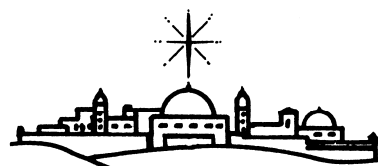

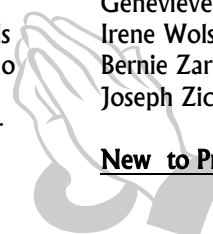
